ORIENTAL EXCITEMENT.

San Francisco, June 17.—Advices from the Orient by the flag de Janeiro. In a recent agreement between the Japanese troops and rebels against the new rulers in Northern Formosa, the former, besides securing large quantities of Mauser rifles, succeeded in capturing the famous rebel chief Sen Biao (Tan Shin) who had succeeded in evading capture over since the first arrival of the Japanese. Sen Biao during the Chinese occupation was one of the highest military officers in the Chinese army. Since the Japanese occupation he has received constant aid from Foe Chow.

The German officers who have been engaged in drilling the Chinese troops at Woo Sheng, China, have had to cancel their tuition to the point of teaching their charges the threefold effects of matter. Recently it was decided to discharge about one-half of the native drilled troops, who were in camp of 50 each, replacing them by a corresponding number of foreign drilled men from the forts. The discharged soldiers were given three months extra pay, but they clamored for seven months and on May 7 broke into open mutiny, looting the officers' quarters, pulling down the houses and threatening to shoot the general in command. The principal leader was seized, tried by drumhead court-martial and summarily beheaded. It is stated that not a single Chinese official was present at the execution, all having charge the threefold effects of matter. On the morning of the 17th three more of the ringleaders were executed.

Details of the murder of the French Catholic priest, Masi, at Lohi show that the crime was committed by a marauding band and that no anti-Christian sentiment actuated the criminals.

According to late advices from Swatow the rebellion in Kauchou and Lohou prefectures, Kuang Tung, appears to be quite serious.

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THE OUTLAWS WERE HARD GAME

Deputy United States Marshals Were too Much for Them, However.

LEADER OF THE GANG KILLED

One Man Captured—The Others Escaped—Were Terror of Indian Territory—Prisoner Refused to Give His Name.

Wichita, Kan., June 17.—A battle was well fought between Deputy United States Marshals and outlaws in the heavily timbered country about thirty miles northeast of the town of Antlers, 1. T., last night. The posse of deputies was headed by Deputy United States Marshal McIlwain, of Leigh, 1. T., and the leader of the outlaws was R. M. McCarty, who has an unenviable record as a "killer." A bullet from McIlwain's gun killed McCarty and seriously wounded a man who sat in front of him on his horse. McCarty was dead when the officers came up, but his companion was game and fought with pistol and knife until overcome. The rest of the outlaws escaped. One of two of the posse received slight wounds, but none were hurt seriously.

The wounded outlaw refused to give his name and told the officers just to call him "Judge." He has been lodged in a federal jail at Antlers on a charge of assault to kill a United States officer.

Petition from John Glaser, et al., requesting that the county road, from Astoria to Nehalem, be purchased between Deady's gate and Leath's hill, a distance of 1/2 mile. Ordered referred to supervisor of Road Dist. No. 7.

Communication from A. J. Sherry, Supervisor, Road Dist. No. 12, stating that O. A. Cole, has failed to construct or build the bridge on road No. 4, according to his bid. Ordered that he award a contract to any person who will build said bridge for the amount bid by O. A. Cole.

In the matter of the improvement of the south half of Commercial street between 7th and 8th streets. The court having examined the bids received for the above improvement, and it appearing that the bid of L. Lebeck is the lowest bid received, it is ordered that same be accepted and contract awarded, provided that the city of Astoria consents to improve the north half of said street.

Ordered that court do not adjourn until tomorrow at 10 o'clock a. m. Thursday, July 16, 1927, 21 day of term, same present as yesterday.
