OREGON'S OUTLOOK.
This Year Will Be a Good One, Says Mr. Harder.

"Few states, or sections of the country, can show as large a list of surpluses for 1927 as Oregon," said Mr. Wm. Harder, general agent of the Great Northern railway, yesterday afternoon, in an Astorian reporter. "Look at the list: Wheat, Wool, Hops, Salmon, Cattle and sheep, Fruit."

"I have just returned from Eastern Oregon and the Palouse country, and have recently been through the Willamette valley. There is nothing gained. The average is 25 per cent greater than last year, the quality is better, the yield is greater and the prices are good. The recent rains have insured one of the greatest crops ever raised in the state. Prices are quite sure to remain good, as a result of the scarcity of localities in other countries."

"Oregon never saw a larger crop of wool. Warehouses are bursting with the piles of sacks of wool stacked in them, and tons are piled upon the station platforms. Some of it is already beginning to move East, and it is now worth two cents per pound more than it was last year, and is much better in quality. "A much larger acreage in hops was planted this year, and the season is favorable, with prices ruling upwards, so that growers will make instead of losing money."
