

A FLASH OF WHITE FIRE

Illuminated the City of Wichita, Kansas, Last Night.

A GREAT AEROLITES VISIT

Drops to Earth with a Loud Report—Shook Felt in Various Places—People Frightened.

Wichita, Kan., June 2.—With a flash that lighted up the city, a ball of white fire shot across the sky at 10:30 o'clock last night. The dash lasted one and three-quarters minutes. It seemed to be about the size and shape of a barrel and bright, still blazed flared out from the sides and followed it. The streets became light as day. In the northwest the third burned to a bright coal and dropped on down to the horizon, after which was heard a sharp heavy report that rumbled like thunder for fully a minute. George Daisy, who was driving two miles northwest of town, was severely shocked and his horse was knocked to the ground. People ran out on the streets in excited crowds. Mavane reports that the shock was distinctly felt there, and that the light appeared about as it did here. The night operator at Burton, northwest of here, and between this place and Hutchinson, reports that the shock there was severe and seemed to come from the south. Nothing could be learned from Hutchinson. At Garden Park, the west of here, the shock came from the north. Hon. E. F. Ware, Dr. G. Johnson and the local weather observer, Major Twing, are of the opinion that a great aurora has fallen northwest of town.

The new three and a half mile bridge and carriage road from the Hotel Flavel to the ocean beach is well under way and will soon be completed. At the vespers service, Grace church, Sunday evening, there was a large congregation, which took a hearty part in the service, a portion of them being commemorative of the queen's jubilee. The church was decorated with flags, and the music was especially good. The rector's sermon was descriptive of the life and deeds of Queen Victoria, and drew the lesson for all that sincere piety always brings its own reward. At the close of the service the boy choir and congregation joined in the singing of "God Save the Queen," with a fervor which showed they possessed a broad patriotism.

The Columbian, Captain Richardson, returned Sunday from her annual Alaskan trip, with Captain John P. Merrill, wife and daughter, and Mr. John C. Graves, of the East, on board. Captain Merrill and family and his guest left for Portland last night. In speaking of the voyage, Captain Merrill said it was one of the quietest and most satisfactory ever made. Everything was found in good shape, and the weather was fine all the time. Capt. Richardson said he never made a pleasanter trip. Flags were replaced where needed and the old navigation in that district are in good condition—better than ever before. Beacons, buoys and spindles are all in place, and in first-class shape. Miss Merrill was the photographer of the party and took many interesting views. Among them were pictures of a large iceberg which was hoisted on board at Frederick sound. It was a piece off the celebrated Pattison glacier. Pilot Ed H. Francis appears beside it with the pilot bearing standing on its summit. The group of the old cat and her kittens, the mascot of the ship, bring on the horizon aft of the captain's cabin. An iceberg in Taku Bay, being a chip from the Taku glacier. A king salmon, caught among the ice of the Toker river and which was hung upon the back of one of the gentlemen of the party, being as long as he was high. The most northern fish in United States waters, in Lynn Canal, which was hoisted on deck and replaced. Miss Merrill's skill as an artist was well attested, and many pleasant moments of the voyage were furnished Captain Richardson by her. The captain reports that times are lively in Juneau, many miners having gone there this season. While at Sitka a raven flew on board the ship and is now one of the pets of the captain, whose menagerie includes a cat and four kittens, the raven and a very funny tame bear.
