

BEN BRUSH WINS THE SUBURBAN

Exciting Race, Mile and an Eighth, in the Fast Time of 2:07.

M. F. DWYER'S GOOD LUCK

Ben was the Favorite and His Great Victory a Popular One—Twenty Thousand Spectators Present.

New York, June 22.—At last luck has changed and M. F. Dwyer has carried off the great race of the year, the suburban, in the fast time of 2:07. It was a victory for the favorite and consequently a popular one. Fully 20,000 people saw the race.

The day was a perfect one, and the track was fast. There was a slight delay at the post, but within five minutes the horses were away on their journey. The winner was first to show in the front, followed by his stable companions, Belmont, Havoc, Sir Walter, Ben Brush and others, although there was little to choose between them. The turning around the lower turn occupied thirteen and three-fourths seconds. Then began the race, for Havoc was given his own way and became the pacesetter. Close behind was Sempor Ego; then came Ben Brush, the favorite, half a length away, with his boy doing all in his power to hold him. It was in that order they passed the first-half-mile mile in 1:12. On the way to the three-quarter pole condition began to tell, and Sempor Ego dropped back to the rear ranks, his place being taken by Ben Brush.

The mile post was reached in 1:42 1/2. Havoc kept his advantage of a neck, while Ben Brush was a length and a half in front of the winner, and the others beaten. They rounded the turn in safety and straightened out for home. Then Sempor Ego began driving Ben Brush, while Ben Brush was urging, but with little effect, on Havoc. Brush responded to every lash and inch by inch narrowed the space between him and Havoc. Now he was at the horse's saddle, at his shoulders, at his ears, and now his nose was in front and Sempor Ego knew that all he had to do was to keep on driving.

The danger was not all over, for the crowd dropped the shout of Ben Brush and raised the winner's name for second place. A giraffe over his shoulder saw the determined Sempor driving the winner as only he can, and rapidly gaining ground. It was a desperate race. Nearer and nearer drew the finish line, and nearer came the winner. One vicious cut to Ben Brush, one frantic push with the knees, and he was over the line in safety, the winner of the coveted suburban, with the winner half a length away and Havoc in the third place, five lengths in front of the rest of the field.
