

The American Ship Eureka.

This good old American Ship, built by Jeff Southard in Richmond, Me., twenty-one years ago, and still owned there, was in her day the most modern wooden ship with copper hottom. The Eureka arrived in Astoria on the 24th inst., 51 days from Nagasaki, Japan, having been detained on her voyage by a typhoon and unusually rough weather. She is in ballast, and left yesterday up river for Portland, where she will load lumber for a foreign port. Three years ago she was on Puget Sound, and Captain Darrah declares that she is yet good for many years active service. All of the sailors were paid off here, some thirty in number, and all, with the exception of the mate, carpenter and steward, are ashore in Astoria.
