The preparations for the celebration of the Fourth of July in Astoria are almost completed, and if every citizen does his duty, the day will be one of the greatest in the history of the city.

Contractor Robert Wakefield, who was down from Portland yesterday, said that he would finish his portion of the railroad line between Tongue Point and the Eagle cannery within two weeks.

At the coroners' inquest yesterday, Antonio Toncha, who accidentally shot Louis Spina, Monday night, on the lower river, was exonerated by the jury from all blame in the matter, and was afterwards discharged from custody on the motion of the district attorney. Spina's

funeral will take place at 2 o'clock this afternoon, the services being conducted by Father Diehlman.

THE SAMPLES HEARD FROM.

Flax Plants Grown in Oregon Reported on in Ireland.

A few weeks ago, a bundle of flax plants, grown from the best German seed, furnished by Foard & Stokes Co., by Daniel Robertson, in the Nehalem, was sent to Mr. F. J. Porter, manager of the Lisburn Flax Spinning Mills, Lisburn, Ireland, for inspection. The following letter from Mr. Porter speaks for itself: Lisburn, Ireland, June 14.

Messrs. Foard & Stokes, Astoria, Oregon—Dear Sirs: I am in receipt of yours of the 26th May enclosing sample of flax which you say is just one month old, that is, from time seed was put in the ground. Judging from its present appearance, I should say that it compares most favorably with anything in this country. In fact, I consider it a much longer and healthier plant than anything which I have seen of the same age here, and if the plant will only grow sufficiently long before it comes into blossom with you, I would predict a most favorable result from the experiment which you are trying.

I am keeping the sample for future reference, and shall be pleased to have further samples and further report from you regarding the trial lots at your convenience, and thanking you in anticipation, I remain yours truly,
