The business men of Astoria, yesterday evening, held an informal meeting in the chamber of commerce room to consider methods of taking advantage of the completion of the railroad into Astoria. Plans were discussed for the building of a hotel which shall be an ornament to the city, a flour mill, export lumber mill, etc. The general sentiment of the meeting was that since the railroad was now nearing completion, and since Mr. Hammond had carried out to the letter every agreement in his contract, something should be done to insure the quick realization to the city of the benefits to be derived from the long fought for railroad. The road itself is but the beginning of an enlarged business at this port, and the businessmen who spoke last night upon that subject were anxious in their wishes and intentions to establish traffic here that will make pay rolls and build up the town. It was conceded that one of the first things to be done was to stand by Mr. Hammond in such a manner as would not only insure the loading of foreign vessels at this port, but the providing of the necessary facilities for handling the business.

Third-Reading of the Declaration of Independence, by Frank Dewley, Esq.

Fourth-National song, "Star Spangled Banner," by grand chorus conducted by Mr. J. B. Wyatt.

Fifth-Oration by Mr. Harrison Allen.

Sixth-National song, "Red, White and Blue."

Seventh-Patriotic sentiments.

Eighth-National hymn, "America," led by chorus, in which the audience are requested to join in the singing.
