

IMPORTANT WORK OF THE COUNCIL

McClure Drainage Ordinance Passed
Over the Mayor's Veto.

COMMERCIAL STREET MATTER

Progress Made in Right Direction—Bond
Street West of Ninth to Be Improved—
Fire Protection Question.

Last night the city council passed a number of very important measures, and stepped into the breach of city affairs in a manner which indicated a determination to maintain the reputation and credit of Astoria. Mayor Taylor presided over the meeting, and at roll call every member was in his seat.

The usual number of petitions, communications and committee reports approving the ordinary bills and pay rolls for the month of June, were presented and approved.

The most important action taken during the evening was the passage over the mayor's veto of the ordinance authorizing the McClure drainage system. A lively debate followed the mayor's communication, participated in by Parker, Welch, McGregor, Thompson and others. Mr. Parker took the ground that the property-owners in the district were entitled to the relief sought by the passage of the ordinance. Mr. Thompson agreed with Parker, and said that the danger to the Fourth street school premises alone warranted the expenditure of the amount of money necessary to complete the work. Welch supported the mayor's view, on the ground that legal technicalities had not been properly complied with, although he was anxious to see the improvement made. Parker remarked that a two-thirds vote for the ordinance would settle the whole question, regardless of the legal points raised. McGregor argued by Welch for conservatism, but wanted to see the improvement made as soon as possible, as all of the valuable property in the district concerned was in great danger. When the question was put, the vote for the ordinance stood: Irvin, Clinton, McGregor, Parker, Schellie, Thompson and Trullinger, Nays—Silverton and Welch. The ordinance was then carried over the mayor's veto.

The chief of police reported that in collecting the warrants for benefits assessed against property-owners for the extension of Commercial street, he had been given the following written orders against damages in settlement of the benefit collections: W. W. Parker, 675; John W. Welch, 300; D. H. Welch, 31,264; James W. Welch, 245; Sarah E. Wood, 215; John McCann, 180; Sydney Dell, 275; Ellen S. Cherry, 120; George H. Durham, 133.3. The report was referred to the committee on ways and means.

Mrs. E. V. Fulton, the Astoria and Columbia River railroad, and others filed a communication to the effect that Commercial street had already been dedicated to the city, and that therefore it was somewhat out of place to attempt to collect damages from property-owners upon a condemnation of the street. The communication was accompanied by the original deed of dedication, signed by the principal property-owners along the proposed street. The matter was referred to the Committee on streets and public works.

The dog license master was taken up in the shape of a report from the committee recommending that the ordinance proposed at the last meeting to keep dogs off the streets be not passed, adopted.

The following ordinances were acted upon: Authorizing the issuance of warrants for the collection of the unpaid assessments on the Second street sewer, passed under suspension of the rules.

Apropropriating \$100 out of the road and erosion fund for N. Clinton & Co. read second time.

Authorizing improvement of Twentieth street from Exchange to Commercial, read second time.

Providing for prevention of fires amending ordinance No. 86 making it a misdemeanor to display a notice of offense to clean off roofs, etc., passed under suspension of the rules.

Prohibiting the erection of poles and the public streets without properly hitching them; read once and referred to committee on streets and public ways.

Regulating the erection of poles and hanging of wires for electric light, power, telegraph and street car companies, passed.

Appropriating \$200 for N. Clinton & Co. passed.

Appropriating \$200 for L. Lebeck, passed.

The following resolutions were passed: Extending the thanks of the council to Chief Engineer J. Q. Jamison for his assistance in the matter of the McClure drainage system.

Instructing the fire and water committee to investigate the matter of protection from fire in the district east of Banthorn's cannery.

Authorizing the chief of police and city treasurer to accept the orders given by property-owners against damages in the matter of Commercial street extension in

payment of warrants for benefits assessed and now being collected.

Instructing the city auditor to give notice of the intention of the city to improve Bond street from Ninth west to the foot of the hill, or the old McClure line.

The grand chancellor's visit was for the purpose of exemplifying the secret work of the order, which he did in a careful and painstaking manner. After the session of the lodges, Mr. Oliver was entertained at a banquet at Jeff's restaurant by the local members of the order. A most enjoyable and profitable evening was spent by all.

OLGA NETHERSOLE
Sues the Frohmanns for Damages to Her Reputation.

New York, July 2.—A special to the Journal and Advertiser from London says:

Olga Nethersole has served papers upon Daniel and Charles Frohman in a suit for slanders to her personal reputation and a percentage share of the profits in the abandoned London season. Miss Nethersole had a contract with the Frohmans for eight weeks in London this summer, at \$2000 a week and a percentage of the profits. The Frohmans did not fulfill the contract, she says, but paid the amount of the salary for eight weeks to her solicitor. She claims damages to her reputation in not being allowed to play, as well as the loss sustained by these few weeks of profits for her to share in.
