Gables, Marshfield; C. H. Colander, Knappa, were guests of the Occident yesterday. The Northern Pacific has very nearly completed the laying of the new rails between Goble and Portland. Under the agreement with Mr. Hammond, as stated some months ago, exclusively by the Astorian, the rails are of the same weight as those being laid on the Astoria road, to facilitate the interchange of traffic between the two lines and between Astoria and Portland. Mr. H. M. Hughes and wife of Idaho, are in the city, visiting brother, Colonel E. C. Hughes. Mr. Hughes says that general business in Idaho is rather quiet. A large amount of work is being done, however, in the mines near Boise. Placer mines are paying well. One company has a plant with thirty-five miles of fluming and an invested capital of about \$50,000. They can raise gold, if nothing else. The new time card just issued by the A. & C. R. R. is like that of any large road, and enforces the same rules for the guidance of employees as the Northern Pacific has in force. Conductors are required to regulate their watches daily by the clock in the Warrenton depot. The baggage schedule is complete in its details and the freight tariff, which will be issued today, will cover all classes of goods and merchandise. The A. F. C. football team will give an excursion to Ilwaco on Friday evening, leaving Astoria at 4:30 p. m., where the club will meet the Fort Canby team on the Ilwaco grounds on the arrival of the Astoria boat. This game will be one of the best of the series, and anyone wishing to accompany the players had better see the secretary, F. G. Gunn, before noon on Friday, so that transportation can be arranged and all made comfortable. In the county court yesterday the reports of the county clerk and county treasurer were presented and filed for further consideration. J. C. Adams was awarded the contract for building the wire fence around the Potter's field in Clatsop cemetery at a price of \$12 per rod. In the matter of the petition of R. M. Gaston et al. for the location of a county road, R. M. Wooden, Nathan Anderson and W. G. Prescott were appointed viewers. Mr. John W. Knight, of Glen Falls, New York, and his brother, Mr. Wm. Knight, of London, England, are in the city, the guests of Mr. Joseph Suprenant. Glen Falls is the old home of Mr. Suprenant, and Mr. Knight is a neighbor of Mr. Suprenant's mother, who is still living in that city. This is the first visit of these gentlemen to the Pacific coast. They came West by way of the Northern Pacific, making an extended visit in the Yellowstone Park. They will return East via San Francisco, the Yosemite valley, Salt Lake, the Denver & Rio Grande, Marshall Pass, Colorado Springs, the Garden of the Gods, Denver and Chicago. Mr. William Knight said that in London there was rather an unfavorable opinion, in certain quarters, of Columbia river canned salmon. "My visit among the canneries today has simply been a revelation. The cleanliness of the work, the skill of the workmen, the freshness and sweetness of the fish were indeed a surprise to me, and I shall take pleasure in telling at home what I have seen here. I am more than pleased with the fine harbor at Astoria, and believe that it has a great future before it. We shall make another visit here. I never saw such fish in my life as were brought into Kinney's cannery this afternoon. One boat delivered 500 pounds of salmon, ranging from 25 to 45 pounds each, and they were the fattest specimens of fish kind to be found anywhere. Almost while we stood watching them handled from

the boat, they were cut up and placed in the cans, proving beyond doubt that Columbia river fish are packed right out of the water." From Kinney's the party visited the can factory of the Pacific Sheet Metal Works, and were much interested in the magnificent machinery and tremendous amount of business handled at that factory. A visit was also paid to the new water works and the system thoroughly examined. Both of the visitors expressed unbounded pleasure at all they had seen.

Mr. W. G. Howell went to Portland, Tuesday night, on the Porter, with the credit man of Washburn & Co., wholesalers, to see what arrangements could be made to pull the firm of Howell & Ward out of its difficulties. The credit man told an Astorian, before leaving, that he thought it probable the creditors could make some arrangement to strengthen the matter out. Mr. Howell is expected back in a day or two. His friends say that he was carrying the whole load of responsibility for the firm and the county treasurer's office, had all the work to do, and was not any more to blame than his partner. Feeling an equal responsibility with Mr. Ward, and having always felt for him as a partner might he did not hesitate to assign his property and interests in the firm to the bondsmen to facilitate the adjustment of matters. Bondsmen J. W. Welch commenced taking stock yesterday and expects to finish in three days. There are always two sides to a story. Mr. Jacoby, who has been spending a few days in the city in the interest of a cannery machine patent, yesterday visited Ilwaco and was persuaded by one of the gentlemen there to climb Scarborough hill, in order to get the fine view of the river and surrounding country. Reluctantly Mr. Jacoby consented and was fitted out with a pair of straw boots and a couple of dogs accompanied him up the mountain. All went smoothly until Mr. Jacoby reached the half way mark, and had begun to really enjoy his tramp. Suddenly the dogs who were in advance, returned to his feet and barked away again up the hill, heedless of his signals. Determined to investigate the cause of their strange actions, Jacoby hurried forward and soon overtook the dogs barking furiously at the foot of a large tree. Nothing was in sight, and the tourist was in doubt as to the sanity of the animals. Happening to glance upwards however, he soon discovered the cause of their anxiety. Perched immediately over his head were two huge black bears, making ready to spring upon the dogs. Being unarmed and realizing that if the bears made the attack the dogs would surely run to him and thus bring him within their clutches, he was at a loss for a moment how to get out of the difficulty. Keeping his eyes on the bears he commenced to slowly back away from the tree, and upon reaching a safe distance, drew a long breath, called the dogs, returned to town, and handed back the boots with thanks.
