Brazee, will make round trips daily, except Sunday, leaving Rainier at 1:30 a. m., reaching Astoria at 10:30, landing at the Fourteenth street wharf, and departing on her return at 1:30. Prompt time and the best service is guaranteed for both passengers and freight.

Col. G. H. Mendell, retired, late supervising engineer for the Northwest Pacific coast, arrived in Portland on Wednesday, on his return from Alaska. Col. Mendell's labor has been identified with the construction of the jetty work at the mouth of the Columbia from its inception to the completion of the structure today, and this will probably be his last visit in Astoria for some time.

The footballers leave tonight on the steamer Queen from Fisher's dock at 4:30 for Ilwaco where they will meet the Port Canby players, and a hot game is expected. The Astorians are the favorites, but they realize that they have a hard battle before them. Quite a number of the team's supporters, including several ladies, have applied to Secretary Gunn for transportation, and no doubt by noon today all the seats on the boat will be taken.

The two motor cars were brought across from Warrenton yesterday and side-tracked in the Scow bay yards. They will be taken out this morning on their first official trip. The motor engine has been in the Scow bay yards for the past several days, receiving the new water tanks. The work was completed last night. The cars have been handsomely painted and the letters A. & C. R. R. added in a prominent place. The new time card goes into effect today, giving Astoria fourteen trains in and out every twenty-four hours.

Reports from various canneries show that the past two days have given a decided increase in the number of fish taken from the river. The water has again cleared so that day fishing is scarcely profitable, and last night a majority of the boats were on the river. It is now thought by many fishermen that the balance of the season will enable them to make good the poor catch since the beginning of the season. At the receiving scow for the Goldie cold storage plant they continue to purchase all the large, sound fish obtainable, and as they are paying a slightly advanced price, are kept pretty well supplied.

Last evening, in the lecture room of the Congregational church, Rev. W. E. Copeland, of Salem, Oregon, lectured to an appreciative audience upon the subject, "The New Woman Ordained of God to End the World." The point of view taken by the speaker was that the emancipation of woman meant the release also of the world from the thrallism into which the grogser man has thrown it. The lecture was frequently applauded, and from the interest manifested, it is safe to say that he will meet with a most cordial reception when he again visits Astoria. Rev. Copeland leaves on the boat this morning for Portland, where he lectures this evening, and from thence to the Sound, for a course of lectures in the different cities.

Yesterday afternoon the pilot schooner Jesse arrived in, twelve days from San Francisco. Captain Corder acted as skipper and Captain Forehen as mate. Besides these two officers were Robert Carruthers, owner; Captain Perchen's son, Wm. Robinson, a cook and two sailors. Mr. Robinson is a former As-

torian, having been connected at one time with a North Shore cannery. The Jesse arrived off the bar early yesterday morning, but on account of light wind did not cross in until the afternoon. The voyage up from San Francisco was without incident. The entire trip, with the exception of four hours, was with strong head-winds, which greatly retarded their progress. The Jesse has been placed in excellent shape, having been thoroughly overhauled and painted. A portion of the work was done in Oakland creek and the balance while on the Merchants' dry dock. The schooner will go into commission again soon.

County officers arrested. Complaint Filed Against R. L. Ward and W. G. Howell. No little sensation was created yesterday afternoon by the arrest of County Treasurer R. L. Ward and his deputy, W. G. Howell, on a charge of larceny of public money. By the majority of the people it was wholly unexpected, for when the bondsmen went before the county court and assured that body that they would make good the treasurer's shortage, it was generally expected that criminal proceedings would not be taken against the two officials. For the past two days, however, various parties have urged the county judge and commissioners to carry out the law to the letter, and yesterday matters were brought to a crisis by Collector C. H. Page, who stopped Judge Gray and the commissioners on the street and referred to the matter in very plain language. He was assured that the county court were making a full investigation of the case, but that he was at liberty to prefer charges if he so desired. Later in the afternoon the court made an order that the district attorney be instructed to proceed against Treasurer Ward and Deputy Howell for misappropriation of public monies, and a copy of the order was delivered to Deputy District Attorney Allen. A complaint was immediately drawn, signed by Collector C. H. Page, and given to Constable Wickman to serve. A few minutes later both Mr. Ward and Mr. Howell were under arrest. They were taken before Justice Abercrombie, and waiting examination, were placed under bonds of \$100 each to await the action of the grand jury. L. C. Kinsey and Charles Ward qualified in the sum of \$100 each on the bond of R. L. Ward, and Dr. Jay Tuttle \$50, Thad. Trullinger \$100 and William Madison \$50 on the bond of Mr. Howell.

Yesterday Mr. Wingate, brother-in-law of Mr. Howell, and one of his bondsmen, had an altercation on the corner of Eleventh and Commercial streets, and nearly came to blows. Friends separated them before any harm was done. The affairs of Howell & Ward continue to grow worse as the condition of their business is investigated, and it is thought that their liabilities, including the shortage of the county treasurer, will amount to nearly \$40,000. Yesterday several wholesale firms attached the stock of Howell & Ward in sums aggregating nearly \$4000, and others will likely follow today. Mrs. Badollet attached for \$1000, money loaned the firm.

Visited the Waterworks. Mr. Suprenant's Friends Find Much to Marvel at Around Astoria. Yesterday Mr. Joseph Suprenant, accompanied by Mr. John W. Knight, of Glen's Falls, New York, and Mr. Wm. Knight, of London, England, drove out to the waterworks, and for seven miles along the pipe line road. Both visitors were highly pleased with what they saw. The big reservoirs and the magnificent system of feed and distribution of the city's water were highly praised. Mr. Suprenant was anxious that his friends should see some specimens of big timber before they returned East, so the horses were turned out over the Olney road. The road was in a fearful condition after

the recent rains, and when the farm of Andrew Young was reached the party halted.

"There is no use going any further," said Mr. Suprenant, giving up in despair as the road became almost impassable. "I would like to show you some of the standing monarchs of the forest a few miles further out, but you will have to be contented with a view of some of the remains herabouts."

About Mr. Young's farm are some giant stumps, where once stood great trees, so common on the hills of Clatsop. The visitors looked, and marveled at the wonderful size of the stumps. They had often heard of Oregon's great trees, but had no conception, until then, of how huge they really were.

Returning to the city, they reached the brow of the hill overlooking the river and bay just as a great fleet of fishing boats were coming in. It is needless to say they were delighted with the beautiful picture laid out before them.

The gentlemen left last night for California and will go from there East. They did not hesitate to say that they believe Astoria is a coming great city, and in the near future will show their confidence by making a substantial investment here.
