JAPAN AND HAWAII.

The ground of the protest of Japan to the annexation of Hawaii is that there are 25,000 Japanese now there, who have large property interests, and that under the present conditions they are entitled to become citizens of Hawaii, but that in case of annexation they cannot become citizens of the United States.

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It is a right at the foundation of international law, and a new doctrine in international law, that one nation has a right to compel another to grant citizenship to her citizens, or to protect them in the claim of a right to expatriate themselves, or to protest against the denial of that claim.

Disputes have arisen as to the right of one nation, by conferring its citizenship, to abrogate the right of the government of nativity, and to release a citizen from his allegiance, but no question has ever before been made over a claim of right to enforce naturalization by one nation, in behalf of its citizens, on another.

The moment a citizen of another country, according to American doctrine, becomes a naturalized citizen of this country, he loses his claims to the protection of that country. In the oath of naturalization the applicant specifically renounces his allegiance to the foreign country; in itself, that surrenders his right to claim the protection of that country.

The protest of Japan is based on the theory that she has a right to enforce naturalization for her citizens in another country. A more untenable position could not be taken. There cannot be any support for it in international law. Its presentation gives rise to the suspicion that Japan does not expect her citizens in Hawaii to assume Hawaiian citizenship in good faith, and does not expect them to renounce their allegiance to Japan save in name, and that she knows or believes that, although by her law they may be Hawaiians, yet in fact they will remain Japanese, ready at the first opportune moment to throw off their assumed Hawaiian allegiance and resume that to Japan; then she could interfere in their protection and give effect to their vote, cast for annexation to Japan, and interfere, not in their behalf as Hawaiians, but as Japanese.

Has there really been any tariff delay in the enactment of the new tariff bill? That is, has an unnecessary time been taken in its preparation and discussion? The people generally have grown very impatient over the apparent delay in obtaining final action upon the pending tariff bill. This impatience is being encouraged by democrats, populists, silverites and everybody else who is opposed secretly, or openly, to President McKinley and the republican party.

The fact is, however, that no congress since the first one ever made the progress which the fifty-fourth has made, especially in view of the circumstances. There is every reason to believe that the bill will be upon the statute books by July 15. Never since George Washington's first term has a president been permitted to attach his signature to a new tariff law within as brief a space of time as will William McKinley. And when it is considered that the senate is not controlled by the republican party but that there is a clear majority against it in that body the speed which has been made in the consideration and program of the bill is not paralleled in the history of any administration.

Four hundred million pounds of wool, 70,000 tons of raw sugar, \$100,000,000 worth of manufactured goods—these have been rushed into the country to escape the new tariff. A year's supply of wool, almost a year's supply of sugar, more than a year's supply of many lines of manu-

factures, will escape the increased duties. More than that, the manufacturers of the United States will lose that amount of protection, which the tariff legislation was designed to afford them. That which the new tariff was designed to do, in adding to the revenue and stimulating home manufacture, is discounted for a year. Twelve months must pass before there can be any test of the efficacy of this legislation for which congress was called in extraordinary session. The situation is a serious one. Political leaders look grave while they talk about it. Who would have thought that the idle capitalist could be found to handle these immense importations? But it was forthcoming as soon as the opportunity presented. Such a thing never happened before. When the McKinley bill was approaching enactment importers hurried in considerable amounts to anticipate the new duties, but they did nothing approaching this scale. The power of aggregated capital receives a new illustration in the postponement for twelve months of the intentions of the majority of the people of the United States.

Recognition was accorded by President Cleveland in December last to the Greater American Republic. The federation known by that name was only partially completed at the time, but three of the Central American states having united in the union. These were the states of Salvador, Nicaragua and Honduras, which joined in the federation in pursuance of the treaty of Amalcala, signed two years ago. At the time of recognizing the new republic, President Cleveland expressed the hope that before long the union might be completed by the admission of the two remaining states. The news has just been received that the republics of Guatemala and Costa Rica have become members of the new republic, which now comprises the whole of Central America.
