The West Shore Mills Company is rapidly erecting along Bond and Astor streets some magnificent electric wire poles. Mr. Trullinger says as soon as the poles have all been placed in position, all of the poles of the company will be painted a best color, in compliance with the city ordinance. Probably a maroon will be used at the base of the poles, and white above. If all the other telephone and telegraph poles in the city were to be painted in colors to match, a vast improvement would be made in the appearance of the city, and much of its unsightly aspect removed.

W. W. A. Wetmore, Western sales agent at Salt Lake City for the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company, was in the city yesterday. His manufacturing institution employs one hundred and fifty men, and produces iron, steel, bolts, nails, spikes, and iron cast from pipe and structural iron. Mr. Wetmore contemplates placing his goods in this market and will, after this, be a regular visitor here. He said that he was greatly pleased with the Columbia river and Astoria. This factory takes iron ore from its own mines in Colorado, and its entrance into this field marks another advance step in the growth of the city.

A few days ago, in transferring from the O. R. & N. dock to the steamer Dryad, a large empty gun shell for one of the big guns at the mouth of the river fell overboard. The shell measured about three feet in length and ten or twelve inches in diameter. It weighed six hundred pounds. Late Saturday evening, Oliver John Nelson located the shell on the bottom of the river and succeeded in hoisting it upon the dock. He says that the shell was embedded in soft mud at the edge of the river bank, so that only one corner of the box in which it was packed was visible. It took Mr. Nelson nearly three-quarters of an hour after he descended to the bottom of the river to find the shell. Before diving the cap-

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
