There was little change in the fishing situation yesterday, nearly all of the canneries receiving some fish at the new prices. The men had a meeting in the afternoon, but took no definite action. Another meeting will be held today. It is said by those who are close to the fishermen that the better class of them, and those who have studied affairs, realize that the only way to

meet the competition of Port Roberts, other Bored canneries, Alaska and British Columbia canneries, and the grade of fish known as so-koyes, is to make the necessary reduction in price. It is believed that while some of the boat-pullers quit work yesterday, and some fishermen will probably follow, yet enough will work to make a good showing for themselves and complete the season's pack.

The officers, however, soon released him, as he had not been fishing in Washington waters, his net being in the boat all the way up the river. There is no possible ground for the arrest of a man passing through Washington with fish in his boat, any more than there is if he has any other commodity for a cargo.

ATTEMPTED FRATRICIDE

Results in a Suicide in Marysville, California Yesterday.

Marysville, Cal., July 15.--Disagreements over business partnership caused an attempted fratricide this evening, followed immediately by a suicide. As a result William Mehl is dead, but the pistol which killed him inflicted only a superficial wound in the neck of his brother Charles.

The brothers, Charles and William Mehl, had conducted together a prosperous wholesale and retail liquor business. Their relations became strained and the partnership was dissolved, Charles agreeing to retire, selling his partnership interest at less than its nominal value. William openly boasted of his superior bargain, and Charles prepared to open a store on the opposite corner. Several times today William crossed to his brother's saloon, treated friends and invited Charles to drink. Amicable relations between the brothers apparently being re-established. A few minutes prior to the tragedy William had another drink in the new saloon, and then asked Charles to show him over his premises. Charles complied, and during the inspection William suddenly drew his revolver and holding it close to his brother's neck, fired. His nerve was unsteady, and only a surface wound and powder burn on Charles's neck resulted. The shock of the explosion caused Charles to fall, and thinking the wound fatal, William held the pistol to his own ear, fired, and fell dead. Both brothers were prominent in Marysville, holding high offices in local fraternities. Each was a man of family.

BIG FIRE IN 'FRISCO.

San Francisco, Cal., July 15.--Fire this afternoon destroyed the factory and warehouse of the Charles M. Yates Co. on Front street, damaging the stock about \$100,000 and destroying the building, which is owned by the Fair estate, the loss on which is placed at \$25,000. The Crown Paper Bag Company estimates its loss at \$20,000. The Yates Co. carried about \$50,000 insurance and the Fair estate none.
