A NEW DEPARTURE Astoria to the Front for the Protection of Its Trade.

The following is the heading of a
subscription list to be circulated among
the merchants of the city, for the pur-
pose of increasing trade with up-river
points naturally tributary to Astoria:
"Astoria, Or., July 14, 1897.
"We, the undersigned, promise to pay
monthly the amounts set opposite our
respective names to the representative
of the bank, for the purpose of paying
\$15 per month to the steamer Pilgrim,
which is to carry all passengers to and
from Astoria and way points, on her
run, free, on Mondays and Wednesdays.
This is to be in effect for three months
from date of acceptance of steamer."
The steamer Pilgrim plies between As-
toria, Rainier and way points. The fare
from most of these points is as cheap
to Portland as to Astoria, but the dis-
tance is greater and Astoria is the natu-
ral trading post for those people. Now
by running a free steamer twice a week,
Astoria merchants can secure this valu-
able trade, which is a growing one, and
build up a traffic which will be very
important in the near future. Seattle a
short time ago established a very im-
portant and valuable trade by the same
method. The expense, divided among a
large number, was found to be almost
nothing, and a number of leading mer-
chants and banks in Astoria have al-
ready signified their willingness to sub-
scribe liberally, and it is certain that it
will take only a short time to complete
the list, and follow Seattle's good ex-
ample.

The customers who patronize the free
boat naturally will trade with the mer-
chants who support the line, and all will
have an equal show to secure the busi-
ness. A chamber of commerce committee
will probably handle the matter.

IS IT A REGATTA?

Sail Boat Race Set for August 15 Next.
Articles were signed yesterday for a
sail boat race, to take place August 15
next, in Astoria harbor.

The contestants are Alex Holman and
Harry Jones, both well-known Astorians.
Each is determined to win, and by the
articles of agreement each has put up
\$50 as evidence of his faith. Mr. Joe
Hoch has put up a purse of \$100 to go
to the winner, who will take the entire
\$200. But by the agreement the winner
must give one-half of the stakes, or \$100,
to the fund for the summer regatta of
1897.

Mr. K. Thompson has already com-
menced making the sails for the boats.
The boats will be the best Columbia
river fishing boats procurable and will
carry large top sails as well as the
large main sails. Great interest centers
in the event, and wagers are already be-
ing laid on the winner.

There can be little doubt but that a
regatta will take place this year. As-
toria certainly should not be behind
Portland and the Sound in offering in-
ducements for visitors to the lower Co-
lumbia. This will be a great year in the
history of the city. The railroad will
be finished and the greater Astoria will
commence to grow. People are wanted
here to see what Astoria is. People
make business. People spend money.
People advertise a growing town. There
is no better way to get people than to
give a regatta. It need not cost a great
sum of money--prices can be moderate
and still afford all the sport and fun
the most enthusiastic can desire. It
is sport and not so much money that
is wanted.

RAILROAD WORK.

Early yesterday morning Auditor F. O.
Kuetner took out of bond \$44 rails, or
enough to lay the track to the John Day
from the new depot. By night the track-
layers had reached Hawthorn's cannery
and a few days more will see the cars
running through Tongue Point and along
the shore of Cathlamet bay.

About a hundred more men arrived
from San Francisco on the steamer yester-
day and will go to work at once for
the contractors on the grade. In a few
short months the trains will be running
into Portland, business will commence
and those who wake up from their Rip
Van Winkle sleep in both Astoria and
Portland may possibly be persuaded,
when they have rubbed their eyes sev-
eral times, that the railroad is an actual
fact. Those who did not go to sleep
will be doing business at the new
wharves and docks and a grand change
on the lower Columbia, will have taken
place, which will affect the commerce of
the world.

ASTORIA'S OPPORTUNITY.

Line to Alaska.
"The opportunity has been," said a
merchant yesterday, "to establish a line
of steamers out of Astoria in the Alaska
trade."

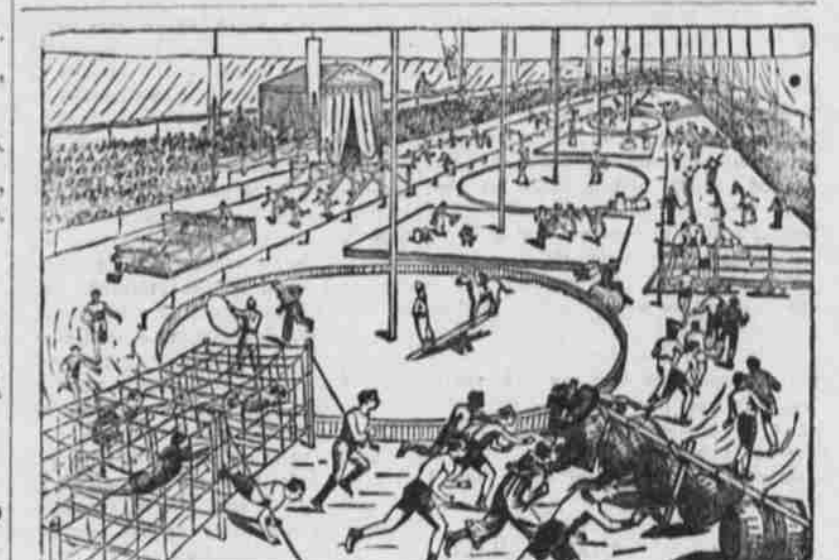
