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THE CRAIGERNE

Arrives From Newcastle With Freight and Passengers.

The four-masted British ship Craigerne, Captain Suffer, arrived in yesterday from Newcastle, Australia, with a cargo of 200 tons of coal for the O. I. Co.

The Craigerne is about nine years old, was built by Robert Dunlop, Port Glasgow, is 200 feet in length over all, 40 feet beam, draws 21 feet, is steel bottomed, and has steel masts and rigging.

She has two steam winches and donkey engines. The ship is in the pink of condition—clean and fresh from the topmast to the keel.

The lower masts were well painted on the voyage by the three passengers, who wanted to learn something of a seaman's life.

Captain Suffer has been with the ship as mate and master ever since she was launched. She will load wheat in Portland, and is the first of the fleet for this season.

This is Captain Suffer's fifth voyage to Astoria, and he hopes to make another after the railroad is completed, and when he can load his cargo here.

The Craigerne brings three passengers from Australia, something unusual for a sailing vessel. They are Messrs. John L. Lang, Wm. Lang and Louis Fulton, of the well-known English shipping firm of Lang & Fulton, who own the ships East India, East Africa and others.

They went from England to Australia by steamer, and from there by the Craigerne. From Astoria they will go to New York via San Francisco, Denver and Chicago. From New York they will sail home by steamer.

They are on a general tour of inspection of the shipping of the world, and will gather all the important data possible to procure. They will visit in Astoria several days before going to Portland.

THE 1887 PACK. Early reports yesterday were to the effect that salmon were running light.

Later good authority stated that the fish had started again to come in larger quantities and that they were chock of good color and sound flesh.

Nine-tenths of the fish are being caught by the seines and traps, as the water is said to be too clear for successful gill net fishing.

One of the principal cannerymen said yesterday that the packs of salmon at his cannery had decreased yearly nearly 20 per cent since 1891, with the exception of 1895, and that his figures were a proportionate index of the business of the whole river.

His statement, in round figures, is: Cases. Cases. 1891.....7,000 185.....35,000 1892.....9,000 186.....36,000 1893.....5,000 187.....22,500 1894.....35,000

On this basis the pack of 1897 will be about 200,000 cases. Others are of the opinion that it will reach 500,000 cases.

The amount that will be packed by the Union cannery has not been taken into consideration in the estimates of the cannerymen, whose figures are given above.

TRACK-LAYING. Yesterday evening the track-layers had the rails laid through Tongue Point and will be into the John Day country by Monday evening.

This is a splendid record for a small force of men, and means much more than appears on the surface. Only a few men can work at laying rails on a trestle, and the whole line, with a slight exception, is trestle work between Astoria and the John Day.

When the John Day bridge arrives and is set, track-laying will continue eastward. The bridge is expected some time next month.

THE FISH TRAP RAID. Late reports received yesterday say that thirteen traps, all told, were demolished at the east end of Sand Island during the raid recently made by fifty boats.

Nine of the traps belonged to Elmore and the rest to various parties. The watchmen was overpowered and had to go ashore, several shots being fired at him.

It is asserted positively that the work of destruction was done by gill netters and not by trap men. The most of the damaged traps have been repaired and are again in working order.

With the probable establishment in the near future of manufacturing enterprises here and at Flavel, there is no doubt but what there will be a phenomenal activity in business before the close of another year. Astoria's merits are bound to come to the front, regardless of all obstructions.

THE FOOTBALL GAME. The Chinooks and Astoria's play football at Smith's Point this afternoon at 3 p. m. The steamer Canby will leave for the grounds from the Telephone dock at 2:30 p. m., no charge being made on the boat to those who go to the game other than the admission to the grounds.

A large crowd should turn out, as the game will be a good one, well played, the Chinooks being a hot team.

A LARGE CASTING. Yesterday one of the largest brass castings ever turned out on the north Pacific coast was an exhibition at the Astoria Iron Works. It is the shaft which is to be put on the keel of the Manzanita and hold the sternpost, rudder and screw. It weighs 100 pounds and is a fine piece of work. It will be put in place in a few days.

THE REGATTA. There is a general feeling throughout the city that the old regatta committee should act again this year, in spite of their protest. No letter men could be appointed; they have the experience and have all the records, which will enable them to do the work much more successfully and quickly than could new men. The time is short.

NEW STATIONS OPENED. General Auditor Kastner yesterday installed agents at Gearhart Park and Seaside and opened those stations for business as express, baggage, ticket and telegraph offices.

Mr. E. J. Miller is the agent at Seaside, and Mr. G. M. Cary is agent at Gearhart.

ILWACO AND FLAVEL. The steamer "Ocean Wave" leaves Flavel's wharf at 8 o'clock a. m. Sunday for Flavel and Ilwaco. Round trip tickets to Ilwaco, \$1.00; Flavel, 25 cents.

Contractor Lebeck will commence this morning the work of raising the building at the northwest corner of Tenth and Bond streets, so that the building will be up to the street grade.
