This assures the success of the scheme to bond the floating indebtedness of the city and reduce the city's business to a cash basis.

INCREASED COMMERCE.
Large Japanese Company to do Business With Astoria.

The trend of events to follow in the wake of the railroad is taking definite form, and the results foreshadowed by the promoters of the road are beginning to materialize. There arrived in Astoria yesterday two influential gentlemen from Tokio, Japan, Messrs. S. Kitamura and S. Morimoto. They are connected with the wealthy mercantile establishment known as "The Mitsui Bussan Kaisha," Tokio. This is the firm which has under charter the bark Tenki Maru, which was in Astoria harbor a short time ago, and with other vessels will visit the Columbia river in regular trade. In speaking of their trip to an Astorian representative, Mr. Kitamura, who speaks very good English, said: "We are here making investigations and getting facts and figures as to trade for our house. We have one vessel chartered and as business grows will put other ships into the service. There is a large field here and the time is coming when vessels can go both ways between Japan and the Columbia loaded with valuable freight. The trouble now is to find a market here for our goods, but it will be easy to do business at this port when your railroad is completed and goods can be shipped through from tide water to interior and eastern points.

"I am much pleased with your magnificent harbor and believe it is only a question of time when you will have a great port and commercial center here. "How about politics and Hawaii? Well I am not a politician and don't believe all I see in the papers. "We want Oregon lumber and flour and will have it in increasing quantities."
