At 12:45 yesterday, the roof of Mrs. Pennel's house, Upeworth, caught fire from a defective flue. No alarm was turned in, but the bucket brigade, under the direction of John Erickson, extinguished the flames after some damage had been done.

The Astor House is in process of thorough renovation, and will be taken in charge about August 1 by Mr. Dan Taylor, of South Bend, and Mr. G. W. Bommer, who will conduct it in first-class style, at prices becoming the times. The hotel is centrally located and convenient alike to residents and tourists.

A new river service has been inaugurated between Astoria and Rainier, Oregon, including all intermediate landings. The fine steamer "Pilgrim," Captain A. L. Draper, will make round trips daily except Sunday, leaving Rainier at 5:30 a. m., reaching Astoria at 1:20, landing at the Fourteenth street wharf, and departing on her return at 1:30. Prompt time and the best service is guaranteed for both passengers and freight.

Bob, the pet cat on the O. R. & N. dock, attempted to follow the Thompson up the river yesterday morning, and was only saved from a watery grave by the efforts of the steamer's watchman. When returned to the dock, he was evidently ashamed of himself, and has not yet shown up.

At Seaside, Sunday, a highly entertaining musicale was given at the residence of Mrs. Dr. Estes. Miss Fox, Miss Holden, Mrs. Olson, Mrs. W. S. Kinney and others delighted the select audience in songs and instrumental music. The parlors were handsomely decorated with flowers, and Mrs. Estes' well-known hospitality was enjoyed by all.

About 80 men are now employed on the Astoria-Goble railroad. The contractors have been notified to have the road finished by October 1st, but it is not likely to be completed before November 1. However, more men will be put on after harvest, when they can be procured, and an honest effort made to rush the job through.—Oregonian.

A peculiar incident occurred yesterday in a question of citizenship. Mr. Samuel H. Turner, who has been a resident of the United States for 40 years, and served during the war, having his papers of honorable discharge, made application for a government position at Fort Stevens, and in the civil service examination, stated that he was born in Canada of American parents. The papers were sent back from Washington with instructions to prove the statement. Mr. Turner, who voted for Lincoln, and ten republican candidates for president, yesterday

took out naturalization papers, as it would take three or four months to procure witnesses as to his birth and residence.

Pilot W. H. Patterson will leave down from Portland Wednesday morning in charge of the new light ship, No. 61, and upon arrival in Astoria harbor, will, if there is time, run the ship past the water front, for the inspection of Astorians. She is one of the finest light ships ever constructed, and is fitted out with all modern appliances, electric lanterns, etc.

THE WOODMEN'S EXCURSION.
Large Crowds Promised During Regatta Week.
Superintendent Lester, of the A. & C. R. R. R., went to Portland Sunday night, for the purpose of settling contracts with the O. R. & N. Co. and the White Collar line for the transportation of the state excursion of the Woodmen of the World, which will arrive here August 22, during regatta week.

The committee in charge of the affair has engaged the entire eight steamships of the two companies for the occasion. Coupon tickets will be issued by the steamer companies, good via both boat and train to Seaside via Astoria, and will give the passengers privilege of stopping here three days. It is estimated that 2,000 people will be on this excursion, as thirteen camps have already signified their intention of coming, and have appointed committees to help the affair along and make it a success. The principal feature of the day at Seaside will be a big clam-bake, for which fifty bushels of clams have been ordered. Three of the best bands in the state, and an Astoria band, making four in all, will furnish the music for the occasion, and in addition to these, a string band and male quartet have been engaged. The Woodmen have taken off their coats and gone to work with the purpose of making this one of the finest entertainments of the kind ever given in Astoria.
