THE RAILROAD MAGNATES
Large Party Paid a Short Visit to Astoria Yesterday.

An exclusively announced in yesterday's Astorian, the party of Northern Pacific railroad officials visited the city in the afternoon. They arrived on the steamer T. J. Potter, which made a special run for the occasion, leaving Portland at 9 o'clock in the morning and arriving at Astoria at 2:45 p. m. There was no special significance to the trip, which was only part of a general inspection tour begun in New York July 27, and the officials could give no information regarding the present or future plans of the Northern Pacific railroad, or whether Mr. Hill had any interest in the property or not, or who President Wilson's successor, if any, was to be. His resignation has been with the board of directors for some time, but as yet has not been acted upon. As it rained current in regard to the matter, Mr. Wilson himself possessed ignorance, and Mr. Adams, who probably is the only man who knows anything about it, gave out no information.
The visitors on the special steamer were Edward D. Adams, of New York, chairman of the reorganization committee of the Northern Pacific; Mrs. Adams, Miss Adams and maid, Miss Cuyler, Ernest K. Adams, Edwin W. Winter, St. Paul, president N. P. R. R.; J. W. Kendrick, general supt.; J. M. Hammarford, general traffic manager; E. W. Melton, chief engineer; George F. Baker, president First National Bank, New York; Mrs. Baker, Miss Baker and maid; Geo. P. Baker Jr., H. A. Fabian, T. H. Larkin, W. E. Blair, W. H. Gemmill, S. G. Patton, assistant general freight agent, Portland; A. E. Moberg, first vice-president and general manager of the O. R. & N.; J. P. O'Brien, general superintendent; B. Campbell, traffic manager; G. W. Lounsbury, agent, Astoria.
Upon arrival in the city, a short stop was made at the O. R. & N. dock, when the boat proceeded directly to Elmore's cannery, where an hour or more was spent in examining the method of packing the Columbia river chinook. No fish were on hand at the time, but fortunately in a few moments a tender arrived with a large lot of salmon, and the distinguished visitors were given a practical illustration of salmon packing. From here the party steamed down the bay to Flaxed and Fort Stevens, and after having obtained a good sunset view of the mouth of the river, turned about and left at 6:45 for Portland.

Mr. Adams, the chairman of the board, one of the youngest financiers of New York, and one of the ablest lieutenants of J. Pierpont Morgan, is an able and easily approached. He had little to say concerning Northern Pacific plans, but was very pleasant in conversation about his trip West and his visit in Astoria. President Winter, who is still a young man notwithstanding his long and successful career as a railroad manager, is an agreeable talker and a shrewd judge of affairs. He said that the party were here on simply a pleasure trip, and had been making a daylight inspection of the entire line of the Northern Pacific, and they had been well pleased with all they had seen.

At the meeting, yesterday, of the regatta managing committee, numerous reports were received from the various sub-committees. All are working hard to make the 1907 regatta a better one than ever before seen in Astoria. Those who have been asked upon to furnish new features have responded well, and it is now assured that in addition to the aquatic sports and races on shore, there will be a number of unique and interesting events. Businessmen are rapidly and liberally coming to the front with their subscriptions. Not a few dollars are being contributed which, in the eyes of the givers, are profits from Klondyke. It is now more than probable that the Monterey can be spared by the government for a few days' visit here during regatta week, although she is being held under emergency orders. It has been suggested that the launching of the Manzanita be deferred until after the Woodmen's excursion to Seaside, so as to give all an opportunity to witness that most interesting event. It is reasonably certain that 100 Woodmen will be in Astoria, and with the other strong crews who will be here, it is more than probable that private homes will have to be opened to their entertainment. So far as heard from, but only the members of the various committees, but every business man in town is working hard for the success of the regatta. It is so, its success is already assured.
