IT IS WONDERFUL. The Veriscope Reproduction of the Carson City Event.

In Portland they are crowding to the Marquam Grand by thousands to witness the reproduction by the veriscope of the great Corbett-Fitzsimmons fight, and the house seems hardly large enough to hold the people who want to see it. Next Sunday evening, at Fisher's Opera House, Astorians will have an opportunity of seeing the same show. Yesterday's Oregonian has the following, in part, to say of the event: While it was true that a large majority of those present had come merely to "see the fight," a look at the more intelligent portion of the audience showed that the feature of the exhibition to them lay in the marvel of photographic and scientific achievement that enabled them, comfortably seated in a theater, to see a life-sized, animated panorama depicting in every detail a series of incidents for which months ago others traveled hundreds of miles and spent hundreds of dollars to see.

From a scientific standpoint these pictures, the creation of Mr. Elison's wonderfully fertile brain, give a practical illustration of their possibilities in other and more legitimate directions. The interest in the present pictures, however, centers in the fact that they represent the big fight, and last evening the audience was wrought up to intense excitement whenever one or the other of the big fighters made a palpable point. The vibration to the pictures throughout the evening made it a little trying on the eyes, but it did not interfere with the following of every movement of the principal figures. All of the 11 rounds of the fight are given, with five minutes' intermissions, that rest the eyes, and during which the lights are turned on and the orchestra discourses selections that furnish a pleasing variety to the pictures. Mr. Johnny Williams acted as lecturer, and, before the opening of the exhibition, he gave a review of the difficulties attending the taking of these pictures, which he said involved the taking of over 150,000 separate negatives, at the rate of 250 a minute, on a celluloid ribbon, or film 2 1/2 miles in length. For benefit of those not versed in pricing lore he detailed the rules governing the fight—"three minutes of fighting and one minute rest"—called attention to the referee, time-keepers, seconds, etc., and generally prepared everybody for the call of "time," when the room was darkened and the powerful electric light turned on, displaying the ring, with the actors in the scene moving about it, including Fitzsimmons and Corbett, each enveloped in a long bathrobe, and giving all the details of the introductory preliminaries and the first round of the big fight. Intermittent scenes occurred between the first and second rounds, the fourth and fifth, the seventh and eighth, the tenth and eleventh, and the thirteenth and fourteenth. During these intermissions Mr. Williams noted the special features to be observed in the coming rounds, and vividly carried away by his recollections of the actual fight, earnestly invited attention to the blood on Fitz's face and gloves, which, of course, being invisible on the black-and-white pictures, created loud laughter, and an exclamation from a piping voice in the gallery of "I see it." Mr. Williams, however, served his purpose, and piloted the audience through the fight in good shape.

OREGON CHILDREN'S HOME

The Oregon Children's Home Society, auxiliary to the national, is doing a most excellent work in placing homeless children in carefully selected family homes—the most natural and inexpensive method of caring for the little ones. The society in 22 states has thus found homes for nearly 5,000 children. President McKinley has been president of the Ohio branch of this society for several years. In Oregon the past 12 months the superintendent has traveled 10,000 miles and spoken 120 times in behalf of homeless children. One hundred children have been received and placed in good homes. Some of these children were placed in Washington, but since December last each state has carried forward the work under its own board of managers. COUNTY COURT

The bondsmen of ex-Treasurer Ward met with the county court this morning.
