"THE FIRST BORN."

Last evening theatre-goers of this city were presented with probably the most original play that has ever been given here.

The affair was unique in that what might be termed the curtain-raiser was longer than the main performance. "First of a Day" is a delightful piece of farce comedy in three acts revolving upon the mishaps of a baby whose clandestinely married parents try to keep it out of sight of the mothers' parents. In doing so it is "lost for a day."

"The First Born" is introduced by a clever overture, imitating a Chinese orchestra. The plot hinges upon the stealing of Chung Wang's first born, Chan Toy, by his faithless mother, Chan Lee, and her paramour, Man Low Yek. In the attempt to rescue the child he falls from the top of a building and is killed. His father seeks vengeance in the characteristic Chinese manner by lying in wait with a hatchet. The author has accomplished an original feat in bringing in three climaxes, with the main climax in the middle.

The company is remarkably well balanced, the principal work falling upon Geo. Osbourne. However, May Buckley, Hugo Toland and J. H. Benrima have an excellent opportunity for fine work, and take advantage of it. There is not a "stink" in the whole company. The stage-setting and costuming was very accurate in detail. It was Chinatown in everything but the intolerable filth.
