O. R. & N. ENTERPRISE. Handsome Steamer to Ply the Bay During the Regatta. With its usual liberality, the O. R. & N. Co. has complied with the request of the regatta committee, and has furnished the handsome steamer Baker to ply on the bay, following the course of all the races, thus affording spectators the opportunity of closely observing all of the details of the chief events on the water. A nominal charge of 25 cents a trip for each passenger will be made, in order to partially cover the actual expenses of running the boat. Hundreds have already indicated their intention of taking advantage of this unusual opportunity of viewing the races. All those who are interested in accurately following the course of the principal races on the water during the regatta will have ample opportunity to do so by taking advantage of the facilities furnished by the O. R. & N. Co. on its steamer D. S. Baker, which will make the rounds of the various races during each day.

BOAT CAPSIZED. Two days ago quite a number of Columbia river fishermen, in their fish boats sailed for Shoalwater bay, where they are interested in the packing company at that point. Yesterday morning, one of the men, Simon Anderson, who had anchored for the night off North beach, was very nearly drowned. It seems that his boat dragged anchor and drifted into the surf, where it capsized. Anderson was in the water for a length of time, but when almost exhausted was rescued by the life-saving crew.

THE ROAD CLUB. It is believed that at the meeting of the city council, to be held tonight, there will be a unanimous vote upon the ordinance appropriating \$100 to the Astoria Road Club from the city road fund. The club built the six-foot bicycle path to Tongue Point, thus opening a good road to the John Day's people, as well as making a fine runway for bicycles. They fell short in their funds, and it is only proper that the city should help them out in the effort to benefit the masses.

BODY RECOVERED. Word was received yesterday that the body of Jack Hanson, the employe of Walter L. Main's circus who jumped overboard when that company was on its way to Astoria some three weeks ago, was recovered yesterday near Cathlamet. A reward of \$25 was offered by the friends of the deceased, but it was not known yesterday who found the body. It was in a badly decomposed state, and will be buried at once.

THE POTRIMPOS. Martin Ford returned from North beach yesterday and reported that two boilers and all of the machinery had been placed on board the German ship Potrimpos in readiness for the attempt to be made in September to float that unfortunate vessel off the sands. Competent engineers have been engaged to take charge, and it is believed that this effort will be successful.
