WHERE OREGON PEOPLE SUMMER

Clatsop Beaches Show Their Superiority This Season.

The popularity of the Oregon beaches has been fully demonstrated this season. Long Beach on the north shore has been practically deserted. Many cottages have been boarded up and remained vacant during the entire season. The special boats run through from Portland to Ilwaco have lost money, and they will be taken off the route this week.

On the other hand, the hotels, cottages and camping grounds on the Clatsop beaches from Flavel to Elk creek have been filled with visitors and are still well patronized. There are two principal reasons for this difference between the two beaches. The south, or Clatsop beaches, are much more protected from the winds than are the beaches on the Washington side, where they get the full benefit of both the north and south winds which sweep the coast at times with great severity. In the second place a business man who wants to start from Portland Saturday afternoon to spend Sunday on the seashore leaves that city at 1 o'clock, arrives in Astoria at 7, reaches Ilwaco at 8, or any other time, according to the tides, and arrives at Long Beach an hour later. He then goes to bed and has a few hours Sunday morning on the beach, as it is necessary to leave at 2 or 3 o'clock in the afternoon in order to reach Portland Monday morning. The man who goes to the Oregon beaches can leave Portland at 2 o'clock Saturday night, and, by way of the new railroad from Astoria, whose time card is not regulated by the tides, as is the railroad from Ilwaco can sit down to a 9 o'clock breakfast at the seaside hotel, enjoy a full day on the beach, returning at 6 o'clock in the evening, and arriving at Portland at 5 Monday morning. Notwithstanding the fact that some fifty new houses were erected on Clatsop beaches last spring, cottages there have been at a premium this season. When the Astoria-Portland railroad is finished which will be this fall, Seaside will become a veritable Atlantic city, and Oregon may well be proud of her summer seashore resorts.
