The Alaskan vigilante is quickly finding his opportunity to emulate the deeds of his heroic and zealous prototype of the early days of 1860. It will not be disputed that the offense of petty stealing is an exasperating one among the heterogeneous throng of adventurers now facing the future hardships of an Arctic winter by way of the Skagway trail, but it may be fairly questioned whether there is or ought now to be a spot of American territory where deliberate murder is a fit or justifiable punishment for that species of crime.

Last year Mr. Bryan went up and down the country proclaiming that there is an indissoluble bond between the price of silver and the price of wheat. This theory he proclaimed with exceeding vehemence, and much shaking of his aristocratic locks. The condition of the wheat market just then favored his theory. There was but little difference between the market price of the silver and a silver dollar and of a bushel of wheat.

But now the conditions have changed. The world's supply of wheat is smaller than the demand, and the price has gone up. Mr. Bryan was so cocksure of the "indissoluble bond" between silver prices and wheat prices, that it becomes a matter of interest to know how Mr. Bryan is going to reconcile his last year's theory with this year's facts.

The people of Ohio are anxious to see Mr. Bryan's aptitude in reconciling fact and theory. It will be better than a sermon. And it is this consuming curiosity on the part of the public which makes him so cheap to Mr. McLean. It is \$1.50 in gold for an unrepentant blasphemy, it will be an act of charity. New York, August 26.—A dispatch to the Herald from Lima, Peru, says: "The financial measures recently submitted to and now pending in the Peruvian congress will, without doubt, lead to the adoption of the gold standard in Peru. New York city, says an exchange is full of merchants buying goods for the fall trade. The New York wholesalers are surprised at the change in the class of goods these buyers are after. They do not want the old staple grades of goods so much as variations on these staples or substitutes for them. Country buyers do not want calico only. Before the hard times they wanted calico and like goods, with a few small lots of what they called fancy goods, but which are staple goods in all the eastern states. Now they want moderate stocks of staple goods, but they also after large quantities of what they used to call fancy articles. Silk and silk products are no longer luxuries with them. They know the difference between the grades of silk, or they insist on being told, and they have ordered liberally of what are known as fancy silks. The wholesalers in Oriental goods and American substitutes for the Oriental patterns have also been surprised with the orders from these same buyers. Their trade has heretofore come wholly from city buyers, and it is a matter of astonishment to them that they now buy from farming communities west their goods. It is true that the purchases of Oriental patterns are small, but this is only the beginning. Plainly the influence of the world's fair and the Tennessee exposition is beginning to tell. The multiplication of cheap magazines and periodicals and the cheapening of the great newspapers of the west probably has much to do with it also.

One of the results of the movement toward the Klondike gold region will be a substantial doubling of the mail service from the coast into that district. Counter propositions have already passed between the United States and the Dominion governments. It was proposed by Acting Postmaster General Shallenberger to establish an exchange of mails at Chaco City and Dawson City. A response has come from Canada in the form of a proposition to perform the service from Dawson City down Dyea through a connection of the Dominion government, with reimbursements to be made by the Washington authorities for their share of the service. It includes the carriage of the mails, one round trip a month, between Dawson City and Dyea, and to this extent the Canadian proposition has been accepted by the Assistant Postmaster General, he announcing the readiness of the government of the United States to assume its share of the responsibility. Under present conditions the district gets the benefit of a monthly mail service, but under the new arrangement a practically semi-monthly service will be substituted.
