Since 1789, when the first tariff act was passed, discriminating duties have been provided for in tariff acts, the collection of which has, from time to time, been restricted by treaties or acts of congress providing therefor. It was feared by the republican leaders in congress that to attempt to restore the policy of discriminating duties fully in the new tariff bill might cause the defeat of the bill. Hence, it was not attempted. But the Edkins bill, providing for the restoration of the discriminating duty policy, was considered as much as possible and incorporated in the tariff bill as section 22. This was purposely done so as to facilitate at a future time, the passage of such a measure as would fully restore the discriminating duty policy, by abrogating such treaties as stood in the way of that restoration.
