Mr. A. R. Paxton returned yesterday from the Willamette valley, and reports that the farmers there are doing exceptionally well this season. One of his friends not only paid off his \$2,000 mortgage and interest, but had \$2,000 left after disposing of part of his wheat crop.

The football game Sunday at Nahcotta, between the Ilwaco and South Bend teams, resulted in favor of the former by a score of 1 to 1. This, it is understood, gives the Bartley cup to the Ilwaco boys. Among the features of the game were the South Bend mascot and the Ilwaco rooters.

Colonel David Dunne and Mr. Charles F. Sitter, of Portland, passed through the city Sunday evening on their way home from the Necanicum, where they have spent several days in fishing. Speaking of their sport, Mr. Sitter said: "I have fished in all the streams of Oregon, but consider the Necanicum the most beautiful and romantic sportsman's stream in the state. We stationed ourselves nine miles above Burke, in the very heart of nature, and had very good sport. I don't fish except by fly-casting and don't believe in the wholesale destruction of fish in our streams by seining and dynamite. We had good evidence that just recently men have been fishing in the Necanicum with seines and dynamite. This practice ought to be stopped, and it seems to me the county court should find some way to break it up by offering not less than a hundred dollars reward for offenders. If the court cannot appropriate money for this purpose, myself and other Portland men will join Astorians in a purse for this purpose. Protection is offered in other directions, and bounties are paid for the scalp of destructive animals. Why not pay a bounty for destructive humans? I have considered myself one of the craft fishermen of the state, and on this trip we secured one hundred and four trout in a few hours' time by fly-casting, but Mr. Zera Snow the Portland lawyer, outstripped us all. He fished on horse-back, and his animal was so trained that when a fish was hooked it would stand still in the stream until the word was given, and then walk backwards until the fish was landed. I never saw this done before in all my experience. I say preserve your Necanicum. It is now the pride of the sportsmen of the state. Clatsop beaches are the only beaches in Oregon, and I predict that next year there will be a boom in the building of cottages and resorts along the Clatsop beach. Your railroad will be finished and the source of revenue to the county. The Necanicum Elk creek, Tillamook head and the other beautiful scenic spots will attract thousands. There is no other portion of the Pacific coast so picturesque and it is bound to become the great resort of tourists and travelers.

The tug Escort, Captain H. H. Snow, Sunday accomplished one of the cleanest pieces of work ever undertaken at this harbor. The tug left Astoria at 7:30 a. m. with a number of interested parties aboard. She arrived at North Beach, where the Portimpos is stranded, at 10:30. She left there at 11 o'clock and was back at the O. R. & N. dock at 4. In the meantime she had successfully placed the four thousand-pound anchor of the Portimpos in 22 feet of water off shore, with a two-thousand-foot steel chain attached to it from the ship. It is calculated by the owners of the vessel, Messrs. Ford & Stokes Company, that the ship will float at the next high tide.

Sunday morning the tug Relief was raised upon the ways at the Smith's Point shipyard in a short time, and Capt. Randall is congratulating himself upon the success of the operation by the Astoria Iron Works. He says that when she comes off the ways she will be in better condition than during the past ten years, and will be in good shape for ten years to come. She will probably have to be

But allow me to cite a poem written by the Norwegian poet, Kristoffer Janson, the nephew of a father, which will vividly depict the different phases of the music. "The following is the poet's interpretation of the "Legende":

The Russian forests murmur and wail— They have a secret to tell; A loving couple were riding there In the night's enchanting spell. Through the shivering foliage the moon-rays played, The peaks rose stern and gray; The son of the step sang out his love In a wild and wailing lay.

Then stumbled the horse—a precipice— Down they went—they shrieked and groined. The wind howled scornfully among the rocks. And from the ravine it moaned.

But out of the moans the love-song broke As a tender dying farewell; Then all grew calm—but the forest's wail. They now have a secret to tell.

Do not ride in the Russian forests When the stars are twinkling above! They will sprinkle on you their wailing sadness. The sadness of dying love.
