

IDENTIFIES HIS WIFE'S EFFECTS

HUSBAND, WHOSE WIFE WAS TRAVELING TO MEET HIM, NOW A MOURNER.

Diamond Ring Found in the Wreckage Belonged to the Wife—The Body to Be Shipped to Denver.

Denver, September 15.—J. B. Dunning, whose wife had left Cedar Rapids, Ia., to join him at O'ary, and was traveling on the Denver & Rio Grande train, wrecked at Newcastle, and has been missing, called on H. B. Hooper, general passenger agent of the D. & R. G., to look over the personal effects found in the wreckage. He positively identified a diamond ring as one owned by his wife. It was found in a hand satchel. He believes the remaining unidentified body is that of his wife. The body is expected to arrive in Denver today, when he will determine definitely whether it is the body of his wife.

THE NEWCASTLE WRECK.

Glenwood Springs, Colo., September 15.—An important relic of the Newcastle wreck came to light today. It is in the possession of George Donald, of this city, and was found by his wife. It is a two-bladed knife with a corker on the back. The blades are peculiarly made. The knife can be easily recognized by anyone who has seen it before. Inquiry is now coming in rapidly for the dead personal descriptions of no use. Dispatches should give some article of possession. Several railroad men are here en route to Newcastle to attend the railroad's investigation of the fearful wreck.

DIDN'T MEAN TO KILL HIM.

Albany, Or., September 15.—The news reached here of a row in the bays near Independence last night, which terminated fatally. Enoch Sylvester, of Lebanon, and another longshoreman quarreled and engaged in a fight with their fists. Seeing Sylvester getting the best of the fight, a young man named Allan Logan, who lives at Toledo, struck Sylvester upon the temple with a club. He fell insensible and lingered until 11:30 today, when he died. Logan, who is aged 16, is under arrest. He avers that he did not intend to kill Sylvester, but sought to prevent him from hurting his friend Sylvester in law. He was in Linn county. His father is Wm. H. Hershaw, left Albany today for the scene.

AGAINST THE NORTHERN.

Goldendale, Wash., September 15.—The case of the Northern Pacific railway, involving title to 130,000 acres of land in the overlap in Skagit county, Wash., and known as the Unstitt, Gilliam, Moore and Sherman counties was today decided by Judge A. L. Miller in favor of the soldiers, the case being argued last May.

P. railroad. It is said upon good authority that the chances are very strongly against the government's appealing from the decree.

WILLIAM GOING TO ENGLAND.

London, September 15.—Truth says that since the return of Emperor William of Germany from Russia he has expressed a wish to visit Queen Victoria in the autumn, and will probably cross from Kiel to Aberdeen in the imperial yacht Hohenzollern for the purpose of making a strictly private visit to her majesty at Marlborough castle. The emperor, it is further stated, will remain her majesty's guest for a few days, and will return to Kiel direct.

DIG HAIL IN COLORADO.

Lafayette, Colo., September 15.—A very heavy hail storm prevailed here last night. The hail fell for a space of two hours and the stones were as large as walnuts. In some places the hailstones were piled to the depth of a foot. Great damage was done to orchards.

Judges in all classes have been elected beforehand and are as follows: Thoroughbreds—Milton Young, Lexington, Ky. Hackneys—Alexander Morton, Gowanus, Scotland; James Wood, Mount Kisco, New York; and Alexander McLaren, Toronto, Ill. Trotters, roadsters and road rigs—David Hunter, and A. C. Hall, New York City; Shelby Harrison, Lexington, Ky. French coaches, pony stallions and brood mares, half breeds and ponies under saddle and in harness—Prescott Lawrence. Heavy draught stallions—P. L. Herbert. Four-in-hands, tandems, carriage and harness horses, carriages and appointments, wagon cars and horses and delivery wagons—Col. Edward Morrill, Philadelphia; W. C. Gulliver and George H. Reed, New York. Saddle and polo horses—R. W. Lives. New Hamburg, N. Y.; Whitthrop Huthersoll, New York City; Trumbull Carr, Havana, N. Y. Hunters and jumpers—Charles E. Williams, Philadelphia; J. D. Chevey and George Work, New York. Veterinary inspectors—W. P. Sheppard, Edward W. Leomis and T. G. Sherwood. The classes and prizes are practically the same as last, with three money prizes in each class, except the championship competitions. The trotters get two \$200 premiums and the hackneys one. (Official Report.)

In the County Court, Wednesday, September 8, 1907, first day of September term. Present, Hon. J. H. D. Gray, Judge; C. Peterson and Howell Lewis, commissioners; F. I. Dunbar, clerk; and James W. Hare, sheriff.

Court met and was duly opened at 10:30 o'clock a. m. In the matter of the petition of John Steiner et al to locate a county road.
