

IDENTIFIES HIS WIFE'S EFFECTS

HUSBAND WHOSE WIFE WAS TRAVELING
TO MEET HIM, NOW A MOURNER.

Diamond Ring Found in the Wreckage Be-
longed to the Wife—The Body to
Be Shipped to Denver.

Denver, September 15.—J. B. Dunning, whose wife had left Cedar Rapids, Iowa, to join him at Ouray, and was traveling on the Denver & Rio Grande train, wrecked at Newcastle, and has been missing, called on H. B. Hooper, general passenger agent of the D. & R. G., to look over the personal effects found in the wreckage. He positively identified a diamond ring as one owned by his wife. It was found in a hand watch. He believes the remaining unidentified body is that of his wife. The body is expected to arrive in Denver today, when he will determine definitely whether it is the body of his wife.

THE NEWCASTLE WRECK.
Glenwood Springs, Colo., September 15.—An important relic of the Newcastle wreck came to light today. It is in the possession of George Donald, of this city, and was found by his wife. It is a two-bladed knife with a cork screw on the back. The blades are peculiar made. The knife can be easily recognized by anyone who has seen it before. Inquiry is now coming in rapidly for the dead. Personal descriptions are of no use. Dispatches should give some article of possession. Several railroad men are here en route to Newcastle to attend the railroad's investigation of the fearful wreck.

DIDN'T MEAN TO KILL HIM.
Albany, Or., September 15.—The news reached here of a row in the hopyards near Independence last night, which terminated fatally.

Enoch Sylvester, of Lebanon, and another hop-picker quarreled and engaged in a fight with their bats. Seeing Sylvester getting the best of the fight, a young man named Allan Logan, who lives at Toledo, struck Sylvester upon the temple with a club. He fled instantaneously and lingered until 11 o'clock, when he died. Logan, who is aged 16, is under arrest. He avers that he did not intend to kill Sylvester, but sought to prevent him from harming his friend. Sylvester is well known in Linn county. His father in law, Wm. Bertleson, left Albany today for the scene.

AGAINST THE NORTHERN.

Goldendale, Wash., September 16.—The case of the Northern Pacific railway, involving title to 130,000 acres of land in the overlap in Klickitat county, Wash., and 90,000 acres in Umatilla, Gilliam, Morrow and Sherman counties was today decided by Judge A. L. Miller in favor of the settlers, the case being argued last May.

WILL NOT APPEAL.

Washington, September 15.—It is probable that within a few days Attorney-General McKenna will announce the course the government will pursue with reference to the decree or foreclosure in the case of the U. P. railroad. It is said upon good authority that the chances are very strongly against the government's appealing from the decree.

WILLIAM GOING TO ENGLAND.

London, September 15.—Truth says that since the return of Emperor William of Germany from Russia he has expressed a wish to visit Queen Victoria in the autumn, and will probably cross from Kiel to Aberdeen in the imperial yacht Hohenzollern for the purpose of making a strictly private visit to her majesty at Marlborough castle. The emperor, it is further stated, will remain her mistress' guest for a few days, and will return to Kiel direct.

BIG HAIL IN COLORADO.

Laporte, Colo., September 15.—A very heavy hail storm prevailed here last night. The hail fell for a space of two hours and the stones were as large as walnuts. In some places the hailstones were piled to the depth of a foot. Great damage was done to orchards.

The classes and prizes are practically the same as last, with three money prizes in each class, except the championship competitions. The trotters get two \$12.50 and the hackneys get \$10.00. One Thoroughbred stallion gets \$50.00 and \$15.00, and mares \$20.00 and \$10.00.

Altogether \$75.00 is allotted for trotters and roadsters exclusive of the trotting produce prize for the two-year-olds. The hackneys get \$4.00. Horses in harness, saddlehounds and hunters divide the remainder. The park police, mounted competition, has three liberal prizes of \$20.00 and \$10.00.
