THE CITY COUNCIL. Little Business Done at Last Night's Meeting. At the meeting of the city council last night, all the members were present, except J. W. Welch. Mayor Taylor presided. The petitions of J. L. Carlson, Chas. Wairus and E. A. Larsen for liquor licenses were referred to the committee. Petition of D. E. Vanaman for redemption deed, referred to committee. The mayor's veto of the ordinance for payment of Thirty-third street improvement was read and sustained. The usual number of claims were presented and approved. The committee on health and police recommended the appointment of Martin Olsen as deputy auctioneer for Strahl, adopted. The special committee recommended the establishment of a street light at the corner of Fifth and Ash streets; adopted. The committee on public property recommended that the proposed changes in the city council chamber be postponed until some future time; adopted. Superintendent of Streets C. W. Holt recommended that the following streets, which are in an unsafe condition, be improved: Second between Astor and Front, Third between Commercial and Front, Fifth between Commercial and Front, Sixth between Commercial and Front, Seventh between Astor and Commercial, Eighth between Astor and Grand avenue, Ninth between Astor and Bond, Exchange between Fourteenth and Seventeenth, Commercial between Third and Tenth, Astor between First and Ninth, filed.

ORDINANCES. For the issuance of bonds in payment of the Thirty-third street improvement; passed under suspension of the rules. Appropriating \$50 for benefit J. F. Voss; read third time and passed. Resolved, That the auditor and police judge give due and filed by the board of assessors on the improvement of Thirty-third street, Harrison avenue and Thirty-fifth street, appointing Wednesday, October 6, 1897, at 10 o'clock a. m., as the time when the same will be reviewed by the committee on streets and public ways and the board of assessors, sitting as a board of equalization. The regular bills were presented and referred to the proper committees. On motion of McGregor, the mayor was requested to write the council of Columbia, O., enclosing copy of a resolution to be drawn thinking that they for its invitation to attend the convention of mayors and conclaves. Council adjourned.
