

HIGH POWER GUNS WANTED

AUXILIARY VESSELS OF THE NAVY SHOULD BE FITTED OUT.

Captain Charles O'Neill Recommends Spending \$500,000 at Once—Serving Crippled.

New York, September 20.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Congress will be asked at its coming session to make a large appropriation for the manufacture of modern high power guns to be installed for service on board auxiliary cruisers of the United States navy in time of war. Captain Charles O'Neill, chief of the bureau of ordnance, proposes to make a recommendation in his forthcoming report that at least \$500,000 be appropriated for this purpose. In the opinion of Captain O'Neill this sum is not too large to be authorized at one time.

It is estimated that \$500,000 will be required to equip with modern batteries the twenty-eight steamers now enrolled in the government service as auxiliary cruisers, and at the rate which congress has followed the last two years in distributing out appropriations, fifteen years must elapse before sufficient money shall have been obtained to supply the ships now subsisted with the guns which their tonnage and structural strength call for. This period will, of course, be greatly reduced if congress should adopt Captain O'Neill's plan and make an appropriation of half a million each year. Under the laws American vessels drawing auxiliary and foreign-built vessels which have acquired American registry are available for improvement into war service. At the present time the largest number of auxiliary cruisers belong to the third class. But four vessels are rated as first class and two as second class.

There are no auxiliary cruisers of the second class. The list of first-class cruisers is composed of the St. Louis, St. Paul, Paris and New York. The property of the International Navigation Company, of New York. The St. Louis and St. Paul are sister ships and were built by Cramp & Sons, of Philadelphia. They are built of steel and their gross tonnage is 11,000 tons each.

MURDER IN SAN FRANCISCO.

San Francisco, September 20.—An unknown man, about 30 years of age, weighing at least 200 pounds, was brutally murdered by a gang of hoodlums on Harrison street. While intoxicated a stranger accosted one of the gang, who was standing on the corner and in the face of him. He was killed and his body was thrown into the gutter. The police have no clue as to the identity of the deceased or his murderers.

MINERS PERISH BY FIRE.

Nashville, Ky., September 20.—A special to the Banner from Birmingham, Ala., says: Fire broke out this morning in mine No. 2 near Houston, in Alabama. Many miners were rescued, but a number have been cut off from escape and will certainly perish.

PEACE DECLARED.

Constantinople, September 20.—It was officially announced today that the treaty between Greece and Turkey has been signed. Most of the European sovereigns have congratulated the sultan upon the conclusion of peace.

GRISHAM'S ESTATE.

Chicago, September 20.—The final account of the estate of the late Judge Walter Q. Grisham was filed today in the probate court. It was approved and the estate closed. The executor was the widow, Matilda Grisham, and she is also the sole beneficiary. The estate amounts to \$18,000.

MURDERER LYNCHED.

San Francisco, September 20.—A telephone message has just been received here that Ashurst, the murderer of Frank Lynch, who he killed at Vallejo, has been lynched by enraged citizens.

THE ARCHBISHOP.

San Francisco, September 20.—Archbishop Riordan will leave for the East today to be gone a month. He will attend the biennial meeting of the Catholic archbishops of America in Washington, and the annual meeting of the Catholic university. Before returning he will visit his old parish church, that of St. James, in Chicago, where he was consecrated bishop fourteen years ago.

RAHIBOR CABINET.

New York, September 20.—A Herald dispatch from Panama says:

A correspondent in Guatemala states that President Barrios has formed a new cabinet. General Gregorio Morales has been made minister of war, Mariano Cruz, minister of public instruction, and Feliciano Garcia, minister of public works. No further news of the progress of the revolution in Guatemala has been received here as yet. A great nation was caused in Panama by the report of the recent attempt to assassinate President Diaz of Mexico.

MURDER IN CALIFORNIA.

Hollister, Cal., September 20.—A telephone message was received last night announcing the killing of Frank Lynch, aged 35, by John Ashurst, at Vallejo, Cal., south of Hollister. Both men were prominent citizens and the tragedy arose out of a charge made a couple of years ago by Ashurst that Lynch had stolen his cattle.

THE MATCH MADE.

San Francisco, September 20.—Joe Chynoweth and Joe Goddard, the contestants in two of the greatest prize fights in the history of pugilism, have been matched to meet in this city in November. The National Athletic Club has secured the match. Both men have agreed to the terms offered by the club, which gives the Australian all the best of it, so far as the purse is concerned. Goddard is to get 60 per cent of the gross receipts of the contest in case he wins, or 40 per cent in case he loses. This is the highest known prize offered as a losing end, but as Goddard has twice defeated Chynoweth, he was in a position to dictate terms.

SHAGUAY RAILROAD.

Seattle, September 20.—New York and Seattle men have subscribed the capital to build a narrow gauge railway from Shagway over White pass to Lake Ben. In the syndicate are included States Refractor Watson C. Squire, of this city; Senator John P. Jones, of Nevada, and John F. McNaught, formerly consul of the Northern Pacific. It is expected to have the road in operation by May 1.

BANK CLOSED.

Rito, Colo., September 20.—The Bank of Rito has closed its doors. The following notice was posted: "This bank closed in voluntary liquidation by order of J. E. McHugh, president. Depositors will be paid in full and shortly. E. C. Chenebro, cashier."

THE NEW ROUTE.

St. Paul, September 20.—Every indication points to a large passenger business through the Ogden Gateway under the new combination over the Oregon Railroad and Navigation, Oregon Short Line, Rio Grande Western, Denver and Rio Grande and Colorado Midland, which went into effect yesterday. The first west-bound Pullman car went through for Portland today with twenty-one passengers.
