

COLOR LINE IN ILLINOIS SCHOOLS

NEGROES AT ALTON REFUSE TO OCCUPY THEIR SEPARATE BUILDINGS.

Determined to Associate With White People Whether They Are Wanted or Not.

Alton, Ill., Sept. 24.—The city authorities have taken a hand in the separate school question. The chief of police was instructed to take his entire night and day force and keep the colored children and their parents out of the white schools.

The men and women then remained at a distance and urged the children to go in. Some of them attempted it, but they were sent back by the police, and none were successful save a few boys who climbed in at the windows while the officers guarded the doors.

A committee of three colored men, accompanied by their attorney, called upon President Fink, of the school board, and asked him if it was the intention of the board to persist in the policy of excluding the colored children from the schools attended by the whites.

The negroes said that the law is on their side and that they are willing to abide by the law. They are confident that they will triumph in the courts.

TO CRUISE INLAND

The Torpedo Florida Preparing for Their Trip Up the Mississippi.

New York, Sept. 24.—The Times says: From present appearances, the torpedo boat Florida is to cruise in the inland waters of the United States with the little boats now assembling at the navy yard in Brooklyn for repairs prior to their departure.

The Porter arrived from the proving grounds at Hog Harbor a few days ago. She is now to the dock, where repairs are being made in some of the minor machinery. The large torpedo tube which was fitted on the deck of the vessel after the purpose of testing the torpedo, has been removed and the old one put in place.

On the way to the training station at Newport the vessel ran into something and broke the propeller blades. She will be docked as soon as one of the dry docks now available can be prepared for her.

AMERICAN SKILL WINS A VICTORY

BRITISH WRECK SAVED BY A BOSTON TUGBOAT COMPANY.

English Wreckers Refuse the Job and Declare It a Foolish Undertaking.

New York, Sept. 24.—News has been received of the saving of the British steel steamer Ethel Gordon, which went ashore in the harbor of St. Lucia, West Indies, last June.

A number of English wrecking companies were appealed to to raise the vessel, but refused, saying that the task was impossible. The Boston Tugboat Co. finally undertook the contract and sent the steamer Orion with divers and wrecking apparatus to St. Lucia, and within a short time recovered 209 bales of wool. The cargo was but little damaged.

NEW MEXICAN TURQUOISE.

A Fine Shipment Made to New York from Unknown Mines.

Santa Fe, N. M., Sept. 24.—Probably the finest collection of cut turquoise ever sent in one shipment from American mines left here today for New York by Wells-Fargo express. There were 25 stones, aggregating in weight 20 carats, and in the collection are four gems that weigh respectively 31, 22, 25 and 22 carats. The latter, a pear-shaped stone, is valued at \$2,500. It is said that this is the largest display of American turquoise ever made. The stones are of a light sky blue and much harder than the ordinary turquoise. The mines are in southern New Mexico, but their exact location is kept a profound secret.

A NEW CHINESE SCHEME.

San Diego, Cal., Sept. 24.—Six Chinese were captured before daylight at Dulzura, 25 miles east of this city, on the Mexican border. They were in the act of entering American territory. Simultaneous with their capture comes a story by Sheriff Jennings that many of the heathens have taken advantage of the deportation law to secure for themselves a free trip home to China whenever they wish to go. This state of affairs, it was learned, prevails as far east as El Paso. The sheriff told Sheriff Jennings that the Chinese recently captured had led to evidence that they deliberately caused their own capture for the purpose of getting back to China free of charge.
