At the M. E. church, last Sunday, Rev. W. B. Hollingshead preached in the morning and evening to good congregations. In appearance he is a quiet, scholarly man, and his simple, direct and logical treatment of the subjects selected for his texts at both services made a most favorable impression on his hearers. He has secured the residence formerly occupied by Mr. J. T. Ross, and with Mrs. Hollingshead, was engaged yesterday with preparations to go to house-keeping. Until the new pastor is installed in his home, it is understood that he and Mrs. Hollingshead will remain the guests of Mrs. Samuel Elmore.

The Quincy, Ill., Journal of the 21st ult., says: "Dr. Ella Patton and her sister, Mrs. Charles C. Van Etten of Chicago, left last night for that city in response to a telegram announcing the sudden death of Mrs. Van Etten's husband. The news was a great shock to the wife as her husband was here several weeks ago visiting at Dr. Patton's with her, Mrs. Van Etten and little four-year-old son having been here some time visiting. He was in apparently good health then, although for the past year he had been ailing considerably. The telegram gave no details of his death." Mr. and Mrs. Van Etten were residents of Astoria last year, and highly esteemed citizens.

Captain Charles D. Stuart, of the Fort Canby Hoisting crew, spent yesterday in the city. He reports that the new light-house at the cape will be finished by November 1, with the exception of the lens, which are now on the way. The new Hoisting station at Gray's harbor will be completed November 1. Ordnance Sergeant M. B. Sutherland will leave the fort in a few days after 21 years' service, having been 11 years at Fort Canby. The sergeant was one of the most popular men at the fort, and last night everybody turned out and gave him three cheers for a farewell. He is only 29 years old, and yet goes on the retired list. He entered the service as a mere boy.

In the circuit court, yesterday, a large number of orders were entered. In the case of the State vs. Kables and Hatfield, the defendants were arraigned and

charged with the crime of maliciously killing an animal, the property of another. They were allowed until today to plead. F. Spittle was appointed to defend Hatfield. Hugh Grover plead not guilty to the crime of piloting a vessel without a license. Michael Antone plead guilty to petty larceny, and was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail. In the case of the City of Astoria vs. L. Lebeck, the jury returned a verdict in favor of the defendant. A suit of W. H. Raymond vs. R. L. Boyle was dismissed. One true bill and one not true bill were returned by the grand jury. A. Sittinski was discharged.

THE BISHOP OF ALASKA. The Rt. Rev. P. T. Rowe, the Bishop of Alaska, will arrive in the city this morning.

Bishop Rowe was elected bishop at the general convention of the Protestant Episcopal church, in 1895, and consecrated soon after and repaired to his field of labor early in 1896, making his headquarters in Juneau. Since his residence in Alaska he has made the visitation of Circle City and St. Michaels via Chilkoot pass, Lake Linderman and the Yukon river, visiting all the mission stations of the Episcopal church in his wide jurisdiction, excepting Point Hope.

Bishop Rowe was rector of St. James church, Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan, when his call came to a wider and more difficult field. His residence there, however, fitted him for his present work.

On his trip down the Yukon he whipped out his own lumber and built his own boat, beating the miners by two days who had kindly offered to help him if he would wait.

Astoria is especially related to the missionary work in Alaska, as a former rector of Grace church, the Rev. Octavius Parker (whom many remember) was the first missionary who ever went into the interior of Alaska from the Episcopal church, and one of the first from any religious body.

He went in 1866 in company with the Rev. Jno. Chapman, who visited Astoria some four years ago on his way back to Alaska from a visit in the states.

That Oregon and Astoria furnished the first missionary for that country, which may some day be the richest of the United States, is a distinction worthy of mention.

An opportunity to see and hear Bishop Rowe will be given to the citizens of Astoria this evening at a special service to be held in Grace church at 7:30 o'clock. Everybody is welcome.
