The suit of the State vs. Joseph Hatfield was set for trial on the 8th of October. State vs. Arvid Johnson; grand jury returned a not true bill, and defendant was discharged. State vs. Pat Kelly and Joe Dever; on motion of district attorney suit was dismissed. State vs. Theo. Kahle; defendant plead guilty of killing cattle and was fined \$20 and costs, or in default, 25 days in the county jail. State vs. Jos. Hatfield and Paul Hansel; on motion of district attorney, dismissed. State vs. J. J. Kenney; grand jury returned a true bill and defendant plead not guilty to assault with a deadly weapon; case set for trial October 9th.
