By unanimous vote of the general management committee of the regatta yesterday, it was decided to turn over to the Astoria Progressive Association the surplus funds from the regatta, \$25. It was thought that this was the best way to dispose of the money, especially as most of the members of the regatta committee are also members of the new association, and among its organizers. The contributors to the regatta fund are satisfied. All the money collected by the regatta committee was expended by voucher, and the books and documents turned over with the money to the Progressive Association, and any contributor to the fund can inspect the accounts.

The Astoria Savings Bank yesterday filed in Recorder Williams' office a declaration of the trust imposed in it by committee of direction in securing the Astoria railroad solely for the benefit of Bonner and Hammond. It is inferred that the filing of this document is simply notice to the public that taxes upon the donated lands cannot be assessed to the railroad company until it acquires title to them by the completion of the railroad to a connection with the transcontinental railroad, nor is it probable that the taxes can be assessed against the original owners or the trustees. This involves a question of about one-sixth of the taxes of the county, so it is estimated by those who have figured upon the question.

In the circuit court, yesterday, in the case of the state vs. A. M. Rowe, the jury returned a verdict of guilty of the crime of attempted rape upon eight-year-old May Pohl. P. F. Heferty was excused as a juror for them term. Ed Edling, Charles O. Green and Hans Henrik, natives of Sweden, were admitted to United States citizenship. Allen & Lewis vs. H. F. L. Logan; judgment was rendered as per stipulation. C. H. Page vs. Astoria Packing Company; demurrer was overruled and the defendant allowed until 5 o'clock Monday afternoon to answer. Same vs. M. J. Kinney et al.; same order entered. F. J. Dunbar, receiver, vs. Astoria Packing Co.; same order entered. The case of the State vs. James Gavin, on trial for adultery, came on for hearing before the jury, and at the time of the adjournment of court, the taking of evidence had not been completed.
