

WEYLER ORDERED TO LEAVE CUBA

GENERAL BLANCO WILL SAIL WITH HIS STAFF TODAY FOR HAVANA.

War Will Continue if the Insurgents Refuse to Submit After Hearing the Government's Proposed New Policy.

New York, October 11.—A dispatch to the World from Madrid says:

The minister of war has called to General Weyler to embark for Madrid immediately, handing over his command to the Marquis de Almodova or General Llanos. All high civil officers and the principal lieutenants of Weyler will be replaced immediately.

The government telegraphed an order to cease instantly all rigorous methods of warfare practiced hitherto.

With the exception of conservatives and republicans who persist in courting Weyler, the majority of the press and public openly applaud the new government for exacting measures recalling Weyler and appointing Marshal Blanco governor general of Cuba. Marshal Campos declined to go to the Philippines, believing his presence in Spain necessary if the eventualities of the colonial wars should make military dictature necessary.

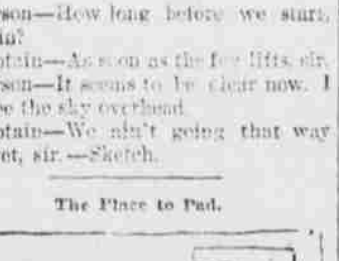
