

LATEST NEWS FROM ALASKA

(Continued from first page.) They took entire charge of the body. One of the brother pioneers delivered a funeral oration. "There are supposed to be 600 or 700 people in the vicinity of Dawson City. The greatest drawback is the government. People are taxed outrageously. The first recording fee on a claim is \$15, the next one is \$100 and seven years following is \$100 for each year. They even charge stampage for cutting wood at 25 cents a cord, which amounts to considerable where so much is used in thawing the ground. Even the dead wood on the ground is charged for at 10 cents a cord. House logs are taxed at 3 cents a log. All goods are subjected to a heavy revenue tax, which is said to be a retaliation on the United States. It is estimated that the Canadian government will collect \$2,000,000 here between last spring and next. "There is much complaint because the United States is so slow in determining the course of the boundary line. It is reported here that President McKinley has notified the Canadian government that a strict account of revenues collected must be kept until the location of the boundary line is settled. A representative of the Rothschilds is here in Dawson City."

WEEP FOR KLONDIKE San Francisco, October 12.—C. W. Matthews, ex-sheriff of Ashland, Wis., has returned from the Klondike to ascertain whether sheep and cattle could be shipped to the mining districts of Alaska and Northwest Territory with profit, and he is now on his way East to perfect arrangements for sending a flock of 200 sheep to Dawson City in the early spring. Matthews is associated in the undertaking with John Rea of the firm of Rea Bros., Chicago, extensive shippers of stock.

RICH ORE Portland, Oregon, October 12.—J. C. King, of Portland, has received some quartz specimens from his brother, who is now on Stewart river, Alaska, which are remarkably fine. King says his brother shipped down 400 pounds of ore and he sent it to the Selby smelter at San Francisco where it showed 17.21 in gold, 27 ounces of silver to the ton, also 28 per cent of lead and 1 1/2 of copper. The ledge is nine feet in width.

ANDREW CARNEGIE'S LATEST ENTERPRISE HE NOW CONTROLS THE LARGEST IRON PRODUCING PROPERTIES. His Recent Purchases Constitute the Most Important Movement in the Iron Trade Occurring in Many Years.

Milwaukee, October 12.—Andrew Carnegie has perfected the largest iron-producing combination in the world by securing the lease of the Tilden mine. He will operate this big producer in connection with the Norris and the group of mines which he owns in the Mesabi range. Dr. Nelson P. Hunt, the well-known mining expert, has been placed in full charge of all the Carnegie mining interests. The series of operations whereby the Carnegie interests have come into control of the greatest group of iron ore producing property in America constitute the most important movement that has taken place in the iron trade for years. When Mr. Carnegie got his possession of the Tilden mine, the importance and scope of the Carnegie concern's projects have become apparent. There are several mines in this combination, each of which can produce more than the Chapin.

THE TOLON CLAIM WILL BE PRESSED MINISTER WOODFORD TO DEMAND ITS IMMEDIATE SETTLEMENT

The Spanish Government Has Once Rejected the Claim as Unjust, and Will Probably Again Refuse to Pay. New York, October 12.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Instructions to Minister Woodford are being prepared at the state department for presentation to Spain of a new demand for immediate payment of the claim for indemnity made by Samuel Tolon. The original demand was presented to the Madrid government by Mr. Taylor who has just retired from the office of minister. He stated in stirring language that this government would expect Spain to pay the just claim of \$50,000 as indemnity for the sufferings Mr. Tolon had endured. Spain's reply was that it was under no obligations to pay Tolon and this has been followed by a statement which declares the action of the Spanish officers in Cuba was a governmental measure and Spain would be unjust to herself if she were to indemnify Tolon. State department officials insist the claim is just and will continue to present it. Tolon was naturalized in New York in 1878. He had a general business in Cardenas, Cuba, in 1896. He left Cardenas for Havana on September 1 of last year, intending to sail for the United States. While on board the steamer Seneca he was arrested by the police and imprisoned for 10 days in the interior porch of the courtyard prison. He was then taken to a small, but filthy cell on September 13 and deprived of all outside communication. He was returned to the interior porch on September 21 and was deported to the United States seven days later. Mr. Tolon has also a claim pending for \$100,000 arising out of the damage done to his property in Cuba by Spanish soldiers.
