Captain Neil Gilmore's little boy is seriously ill with pneumonia.

At 5 o'clock, Saturday morning, December 4, there will be held by the civil service commission, a competitive examination for the grade of clerk and carrier in the postoffice service at Astoria. None but United States citizens can be examined and the age limit is 18 years or over, carriers between 21 and 40. Applications must be filed with Secretary E. C. Lewis not later than Saturday, November 13.

So quietly and expeditiously has been done the work on the Astoria railroad that not one Astorian out of ten realizes that three or four more weeks will finish the work and that beyond the question of a doubt the contractors will be out of the way and the road ready to operate by January 1. Contractor H. B. Borwick, who was in the city yesterday, stated to an Astorian reporter that he had finished delivering the ties for the entire line. The material for the steel bridge at Cathlamet was delivered yesterday. This is the third steel bridge on the line east of Astoria, and is situated some miles east of Blind slough. The temporary bridge across Blind slough has enabled the rail gang to lay quite a stretch of track east of that point. The Harris rail-laying machine will commence work today. Bets were made yesterday that the contractors would not be able to finish the work by January 1. As a matter of fact, however, the work is all but completed, and ten days more will see every cut ready for the track.
