The Astoria Progressive Commercial association held its regular meeting last night and transacted much business of importance.

Capt. P. M. White, who has just purchased the steamer Augusta, is all ready for sea and will sail for Seattle when the weather is favorable. The captain represents a large New York syndicate which has acquired property and mining claims all through Alaska before the Klondike was born. They are miners and will now do development work on a large scale. In speaking of his plans yesterday, Captain White, who is an old friend of Hon. Ben. Young in British Columbia, and was talking with him at the time, said to an Astorian representative: "I will make one preliminary trip at once with the Augusta, carrying our engineers and workmen with their supplies to Alaska. Upon my return will go to New York and will bring from there around the Horn a steamer about the size of the G. W. Elder, which he will use as our supply and transfer boat from Seattle. Our company is in it to stay and already has many fine claims."

Peter Wago, who was in from the Nehalem yesterday, speaking of his new flour mill enterprise, said: "I will erect my mill on my own place about three-fourths of a mile below Pishawak falls on the main Pishawak river. I purpose to grind flour for the farmers of the Nehalem valley for home consumption, and thus increase the raising of wheat in our vicinity. In another year we will raise all our own flour, which will mean a saving to the valley of three to four thousand dollars annually. If we had good roads we could ship our bran and shorts into Astoria and fill the market here. A farmer coming to town besides other produce, could bring a load of bran, out of which he could make enough to take back home groceries or clothes. I shall commence the work of getting out the timbers for the dam and will be building this winter. Next summer when the water is low I will build the dam, and will be ready to grind wheat in the fall. If the merchants of Astoria are willing to help out in the project, I believe they will get their money back twice over. Most of the people in the valley are in favor of good roads, and are ready to help out with money or work. Passable roads are what will bring settlers to Clatsop county. People are what we want, and to get them we must have roads."
