A railroad to Tillamook seems to be the issue of the day in that county. A gentleman who has just returned from there says: "With very little effort Astorians could secure a railroad to Tillamook via Seaside and the lower Nehalem. You would have the beauty cooperation of the whole lower valley and the town of Tillamook. It is only a matter of time when the road will be built anyway, and it is a matter of necessity to the people of Nehalem and Tillamook. It is a question of prime importance, also, to Astoria if she expects to become the center of trade for our valley and city. The road would make the proper outlet for the produce of Nehalem valley and Tillamook bay; it will cheapen freight rates and enable us to buy in Astoria instead of Portland; it will throw into closer relationship the business men of the coast and will open the vast coal fields and timber reserves to your commerce. With your new Columbia steamer line you need cheap coal and can get it by building a railroad. All along its lines would be established saw-mills, and the stock-raising and dairy industries of the two counties would be fully developed. Besides other industries, the fishing enterprise will be greatly aided by the facilities for shipping the raw product from the Necanicum and Tillamook bay to the lower river canneries. This is a matter which should receive attention at once."
