NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE THE AND THE STREETS AND NIAGARA AVENUE FROM GRAND AVENUE TO BAY AVENUE.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Astoria, Ore., did on the 21st day of October, 1897, by resolution, order and direct the Auditor and Police Judge of said city to publish in the Daily Astorian of Astoria, for ten days, notice of said Common Council's intention to make the following improvement, to-wit:

The 4th street, from Grand Avenue into Niagara Avenue, thence Niagara Avenue from a connection with proposed improvement of said 8th street, and into 7th street, thence 7th street from a connection with the proposed improvement of Niagara Avenue, to the north side of Bay Avenue, be improved by grading said portions of said streets and avenues for the space of twelve and one-half feet on each side of the center line thereof.

Beginning at the north-east corner of lot 2 of block 36 of McClure's Astoria, as extended by Cyrus Olney; thence south along the center line of blocks 36 and 37 to the north-east corner of lot 2 block 11; thence east along north line of block 11 to the north-east corner thereof; thence south along the east line of blocks 12, 13, 14, 15 to north-east corner thereof; thence south along east line of blocks 16, 17, 18 to north-east corner of block 19, of subdivision block 10 of McClure's Astoria, as laid No. 5 of Olney's addition to Astoria, as laid out and recorded by Hunter and Allen, executors; thence east along north line of said block 19 to the north-east corner thereof; thence south along the east line of blocks 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12 to the south-east corner of said block 12 in said addition; thence westerly along south boundary of blocks 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31 and 32 to south-west corner of block 34; thence north along the west line of block 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 40 and 41 to north-west corner of said block 41; thence east along the north line of block 41 to the north-east corner of said block 41; thence east along the north line of block 41 to the north-east corner of said block 41; thence east along the north line of block 41 to the north-east corner of said block 41.

Now, therefore, unless a remonstrance signed by the residents of the city of Astoria owning more than one-half of the property in the above described district shall be filed with the undersigned by the time of the next regular meeting of the common council of said city (viz. Nov. 3, 1897), after said ten days' publication of this notice, the said common council will proceed to make said improvement; but in case such remonstrance shall be so filed, then said improvement will only be authorized by a two-thirds vote of all the members of the said council.
