

CHIVALRY IS RECOGNIZED

(Continued from First Page.)

The insurgents would permit recontractors to flock to the plantations, it is said to be impossible to harvest the crops, owing to the extermination of oxen.

Application of the decree of amnesty still hangs fire. General Blanco is anxious to get the American prisoners off his hands, but is fettered by red tape, the competitor prisoners being in the hands of the naval authorities and many formalities must be gone through before they are released. It is expected, however, that they will soon be at liberty.

General Blanco's investigation into the condition of Spain's army in Cuba have already revealed a deplorable condition of affairs. Not only are funds in connection with the payment of troops being brought to light, but proof is being obtained that of the 20,000 men sent to General Wepler, only a small percentage are now fit for actual service.

The towns are garrisoned principally by convalescent soldiers, too weak in many instances to offer more than a feeble resistance to the attacks of rebels.

One of the first army surgeons says that one of the most difficult tasks of the new administration will be to care for Spain's ill troops. In not one of the many hospitals in Havana, for example, is there any available beds. On November 8 the military governor of this city received a message to the effect that 500 sick and wounded soldiers were on their way to Havana. He communicated this fact to the hospital authorities, only to receive the reply that it was impossible to receive another man. The military commander in Guines reports that patients in the military hospitals there are entirely without medicine, and other necessities and that the food supply is entirely inadequate. Proprietors of stores have notified the hospital authorities that they will not furnish any more goods on credit. In other towns the condition of things is similarly indicative of the growing feeling in Havana against the United States. Your correspondent is able to state that the chief of the volunteer fire brigade in this city on Friday dismissed from the ranks two naturalized American citizens. They are Cuban-born but hold naturalization papers.

HAWAIIAN ANNEXTION.

The President Anxious to Have United States Adopt Treaty at Once.

New York, Nov. 15.—A dispatch to the World from Honolulu, dated October 25, says:

Sanford B. Dole, president of the provisional republic of Hawaii, and Chief Justice Judd, are anxious to have the Hawaiian annexation treaty adopted as soon as possible. Said President Dole to the World:

"The people will never again submit to a monarchy. In fact, there is no one, sufficiently enjoying the confidence of the people of the islands to conduct the affairs of state under a monarchy."

"Why do they not desire to continue as an independent republic?" he was asked.

"As the islands are so far away from other countries, and as the Asiatic population is fast increasing in numbers, it is a serious question if they are left alone whether the republic could survive with the consent of the foreigners. Besides, if the United States has constantly to protect the islands under the government at present, why should not the United States take them altogether? This is a great country for commerce. It is the natural land for American ownership. To all intents and purposes it is an American colony, any way, so far as business, capital, and industry is concerned, and it should be a part of the body politic of the United States."

Chief Justice Judd said in an interview:

"During the reign of King Kalakaua there were two cabinets, so dissatisfied with the state of the kingdom. The only branch of the government that was not

disturbed was the judiciary. The restoration of the monarchy is an impossibility. There is no material to make a monarch of.

"Nor can one hope to maintain a republic independent. We must look to the United States. We have come to the turning point, and we must either become Asiatic or Anglo-Saxon. Our commerce is with the United States, we are within the zone of American influence, and to assume responsibility for us, they ought to have something to say about how our affairs are directed."

The news that has reached here from San Francisco that Samuel Parker, a prominent native leader, and heretofore a strong royalist, has declared in favor of annexation, has created quite a sensation among the natives, who are still opposed to annexation.

ELK'S NEW RITUAL COMPLETED

Grand Rapids, Mich., Nov. 15.—At the last session of the grand lodge of the order of Elk, in Minneapolis, last summer, a committee was appointed, with George B. Perry, of this city, as the chairman, to revise the ritual. The committee has completed its task and the new ritual will be exemplified for the first time in Dasey lodge, in this city, December 16th and 17th. It is stated that state deputies from all parts of the country will attend.

NEW ENTERPRISE IN PORTLAND.

Portland, Or., Nov. 15.—George W. McNear, the well-known grain buyer of San Francisco, today bought the Irving dock in this city.

J. Eppinger, another grain merchant of San Francisco, is also negotiating for a wharf here.

It is understood that both McNear and Eppinger intend to enter extensively into wheat buying in the Northwest.

WAR IMMINENT.

London, Nov. 15.—A special from Shanghai, says great tension exists between Japan and Russia owing to the latter's efforts to control the Korean peninsula, and that some of the leading Japanese ministers are urging the adoption of serious measures, even to the extent of war.

THE OFFICIAL COUNT.

Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 15.—The official vote for governor at the state election is thus recorded: Bushnell, republican, 429,818; Chapman, democrat, 401,715; Holliday, prohibitionist, 755; Cokey, people, 625; Dexter, national democrat, 182; Watkins, social, 122; Lewis, negro protectionist, 45; Liberty, 313. Bushnell's plurality, 13,101. President McKinley had 4,97 plurality.

HONG KONG'S TRADE.

Washington, Nov. 15.—Consul Wideman, at Hong Kong, informs the state department that the largest items of import from the United States to that place are flour and petroleum. Regarding lumber, he says there would be no trouble in selling the goods. Exports from Hong Kong to America for the year ending June 30, 1897, amounted to \$1,950,735.

Wideman says there is a great deal of talk in Hong Kong about adopting the gold standard as the merchants complain of the fluctuations of silver. The matter will be brought before the colonial legislature.

DIVIDEND DECLARED.

Washington, Nov. 15.—The controller of the currency has declared a 5-per cent. dividend in favor of the creditors of the insolvent Oregon National Bank of Portland.

OFF FOR KLONDIKE.

Tacoma, Nov. 15.—The steamer City of Seattle sailed tonight for Skagway and Dyea with 15 passengers and a full cargo of freight. The latter includes 32 head of cattle belonging to the Smith party, who will attempt to drive them over the Dalton trail. The vessel also took a cargo of machinery for the Chilkoot Pass Railway Company, which is building a road across the pass.
