American machines of many kinds are making their appearance in England. A London trade journal says they are found in the English factories devoted to boots and shoes, soap, rubber, bicycles and paper boxes. American printing presses, typesetters and typewriters are common in England, and steel rails are going forward by ship loads.

The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, a labor organization that usually tries to keep on good terms with employers and to secure good wages by fidelity to duty, has just purchased a 250-acre farm in Illinois upon which to establish a home for disabled engineers and their widows and orphans. In other words, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers is a brotherhood in practice as well as in name. It tries to keep its members in steady employment at good wages by discouraging strikes and disagreements with employers and to provide for those who by reason of sickness, misfortune or old age are unable to provide for themselves.

Mr. W. J. Jones, a correspondent of the San Francisco Chronicle, who crossed the Chikoot Pass and made his way down the Yukon to Dawson, says of the strike at Skookum Gulch: "In but a day last Friday, a foot below the surface, two men with a rocker picked out \$55 in gold. Two nuggets, valued at \$7 and \$21 respectively, were found, and hundreds of others worth from \$1 to \$20 were taken out. Yesterday and today bowlders were turned over, and there, lying scattered to the light of day, were nuggets scattered in the gravel. The moss is about twelve inches thick, and beneath it two men yesterday picked up over \$50 in coarse gold. Many instances are noted where claims have yielded to two men from \$10 to \$50 a day, and they had to carry the gravel several hundred feet to the water and work with rocker and cradle, as was done in primitive mining. I walked out to the drifts today, eighteen miles from here, and saw dozens of men panning the gold off the ground like so much gravel, while others were standing guard to prevent thieves stealing the nuggets."
