The steamer Alliance, which arrived Sunday from San Francisco, brought up the big anchors of the Yandalla for Foard & Stokes, who will use them in floating the Potrimpos. She also brought a 10-inch hawser—the largest ever seen here—and a lot of chain.

The British steamer City of Perth, 2275 tons, Captain Wilson, 15 days from Melbourne, arrived yesterday. She carries 62 men and is one of the cleanest, trimmest vessels which ever entered this port. Captain Wilson says that he had very bad weather on his last trip over from here, but this voyage was not so bad, though the weather was far from good. He sighted nothing on the trip but a Japanese seal pen. The steamer is in waste ballast and will load wheat in Portland. There is one other thing noticeable about the Perth—her officers are all gentlemen.

A fine specimen of a cougar was brought in from the Nehalem yesterday and is now on exhibition at Hosh and Gillette's.

Horthwick's barge just finished discharging coal at Havel dock in time to accommodate the steamer Mogul with her 100 tons, which will be taken on there today and tomorrow. These big China steamers begin to make things look lively about the port, and what with the tramps coming for wheat, the business of this port will have so increased another year that the oldest inhabitant will not know it.

Referring to the matter of range lights, Captain Phillips says that where there is no light-house already established at the mouth of the river, as is the case here, it will take an appropriation by congress to secure the lights, but that with the endorsement of shipmasters and commercial bodies there should be no difficulty whatever in having the improvement made. There are range lights all the way up the Columbia, where there are no more important.

The steam shovel was brought down the road yesterday and sent over to Skipsnon where it will get out gravel for ballast. Two or three ballast trains will be put out at once and the line to Blind slough will be put in through condition. Contractor Wakenfeld will in a day or two commence the work of building the Blind slough draw bridge, and after that the line will be ballasted east of there as soon as possible. It is evident that the company is pushing matters as fast as possible.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE COLUMBIA AND ALAMEDA AVENUES. Notice is hereby given that the Common Council propose to improve Columbia avenue from its intersection with center line of Bond street to an intersection with the center line of Alameda avenue and Alameda avenue from the east line of Lincoln street to a line drawn from the northwest corner of lot 4 of block 13, Taylor's Astoria, to the southwest corner of lot 20 of block 2, of Taylor's Astoria.

Said improvement to consist of driving spades, 3 in each bent, with bent centers 15 ft. apart, to the width of 20 ft., from a connection with Bond street improvement, at its intersection with Columbia and Taylor avenues, to the center of Columbia avenue; thence southerly along the center of Columbia avenue to the high water mark and placing thereon stringers and planking the same, to the width of 20 feet with sound fir plank 12 1/2 inches laid 1/2 inch apart, and from high water line southerly along the center of Columbia avenue to its center line intersection with center line of Alameda avenue and Alameda avenue through the center thereof, from the east line of Lincoln street to a point of intersection with a line drawn from the northwest corner of lot 4 of block 15, Taylor's Astoria, to the southwest corner of lot 20 of block 2, of Taylor's Astoria, by grading the same to the established grade, to the width of 20 feet and placing thereon stringers and planking the same to the width of 20 feet with sound fir plank 12 1/2 inches and by placing railings thereon where necessary.

Beginning at the northeast corner of lot 5, of block 1, Taylor's Astoria, as laid out and recorded by the Peninsula Land and Trust Company; thence westerly across Columbia avenue and along the north line of block 2 to the northwest corner of lot 6 of said block 2; thence southerly along the west line of said lot 6 to the southwest corner thereof; thence westerly along the center of said block 2 to the northwest corner of lot 20 thereof; thence southerly along the west line of said lot 20 across Alameda avenue and along the west line of lot 4, of block 18, to the southwest corner of said lot 4; thence easterly along north line of alleyway running through blocks 18 and 19 to the southwest corner of lot 8 of block 15; thence east along south line of said lot 8 to the southeast corner thereof; thence north along east line of blocks 15 and 1 to the northeast corner of block 1; thence west along north line of said block 1 to the northeast corner of lot 6 thereof; thence north to east corner of lot 6 thereof; thence north to south line of Bond street; thence west along the south line of Bond street to

COMMERCIAL STREET EXTENSION IMPROVEMENT NOTICE. Notice is hereby given that the Common Council propose to improve Commercial street from the east line of Seventeenth street to the west line of Twenty-third street and Twenty-third street from the north line of Commercial street to Exchange street. Said improvement to consist of driving spades, six spades in each bent with bent centers 15 feet apart, and placing thereon caps and stringers to the full width thereof, and planking the same to the width of 36 feet through the center thereof and to the established grade with new and sound fir plank 12 1/2 inches, and building sidewalks on both sides thereof, twelve feet wide of fir plank 2x8 inches, and building curbs on both sides thereof, in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor and in conformity to Ordinances No. 1001, entitled "An ordinance relating to the improvement of streets."
