The interest in the Klondike relief expedition grows apace in Astoria. Yesterday the secretary of the Astoria Progressive Association received the following additional names of reindeer drivers in Astoria who are willing to join the expedition to be sent to Dawson by Uncle Sam: Norway—Chris Wikkleson, Finland—Gabriel Cozman, John Anderson, Otto A. Harald, Alfred Heikel, John Weupia, John Erickson, Jakob Karki, Wally Kahsas, A. Kaitung.

By far the most important offer made is that of Mr. Wally Kaitung to go as guide and reindeer driver. Mr. Kaitung spent seven years in Alaska and has driven reindeer and moose, speaks the Indian and Russian languages and is thoroughly fitted for the undertaking. It is understood that President Dunbar will call a special meeting of the association today and draft the full telegram to Secretary Alger. No time is to be lost as the matter is an important one to Astoria.

ON THE WATER FRONT.

Lively Day in Shipping Office—Two Large Steamers Arrive.

Yesterday was a lively one in shipping circles the principal features being the arrival of the O. R. & N. Oriental liner Lombard from Hong Kong, and the British tramp steamer Teekai from Yokohama.

The captain of the Lombard stated that he left Hong Kong on the twentieth of November. At Kobe, Japan, five boats out in the hold of the vessel, representing the discharge of a portion of the cargo. The first portion of the cargo, in fact, almost the entire voyage, was a very rough one and he was glad to get into port. He says the rough weather is following him and will probably reach Astoria in a day or two. His cargo is a large one of general merchandise.

Captain G. W. Lewis of the Teekai, who left Yokohama December 7, said that a portion of the trip was very rough but that the weather moderated during the latter part of it and in the last few days he has been in a continuous fog which only cleared off Tuesday evening. The Teekai is in ballast and will load wheat for Europe. She is half liner and half tramp.

The side wheel river steamer Ocean Wave, completely boxed in and both up for the ocean travel, sailed for Puget Sound yesterday morning. As she passed a good beach she was flying along at a good pace before a fair wind.

Workers are still busy on the Glenora, on North beach and expect to be able to float that ship the first favorable opportunity. She is now lying in a easy position and her Portland owners are confident of success. The Potomac, lying just six miles south of the Glenora, has recently been examined and her owners, Foard & Stokes Co., of this city, and others, have by no means given her up, but in a few days will have her righted up. She was moved and turned over on her side by the recent storm.

When the steamer Altes Blanchard was about to sail yesterday morning for San Francisco, her captain got into an altercation with the stevedores, who had been loading box shooks at the O. R. & N. dock, and who claimed fifty cents an hour pay. The captain offered them forty cents, which they declined to accept and went aboard to argue the question. The men were subdued at the muzzle of a Winchester. A warrant was taken out for the arrest of the captain, but the steamer sailed before it could be served.

FOOTBALL RULES.

New York, Dec. 22.—The University Athletic club, composed of alumni of the big colleges, has decided to take up the rules governing the game of football and to have submitted if possible the most playing and the back guard play and to have made other amendments which will relieve the game of some of its rough features. A meeting of the football committee, composed of Dashiell of Annapolis, Sears of Harvard, Camp of Yale, Bell of Pennsylvania and Dennis of Cornell, will be called as soon as possible to take up the matter. Communications have been sent to all the leading colleges and while no answers have been received as yet from a majority of them, the conference expects a satisfactory answer from all.
