

BANK FAILURE IN PHILADELPHIA

Chestnut Street National Closed Its Doors Yesterday.

INDEBTEDNESS OF PRESIDENT

Caused the Embarrassment — \$2,000,000 Raised to Help the Bank Out, But It Was Insufficient.

(Philadelphia, Dec. 23—Special to the Astorian)—The Chestnut Street National Bank did not open for business today. The Chestnut Street Trust and Savings Fund Company, the officers of which are identical with those of the bank, also closed its doors. William M. Stigell is the president of both institutions.

The bank had on deposit city funds amounting to \$30,000 and state funds to the amount of \$25,000. No other banks are involved in the failure.

A syndicate was formed with \$2,000,000 to aid the bank and prevent its failure, as it was stated that if President Stigell's indebtedness to the bank could be liquidated, failure would be avoided. Investigation showed that the amount raised was insufficient, and the underwriters were forced to withdraw their proposed aid.

The liabilities of the bank and trust company amount to about \$3,000,000.

STEAMER ACCIDENT.

The steamer William J. Grossie Detra Troubles.

New York, Dec. 23—The giantess of ocean liners, the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse of the North German Lloyd line, arrived from Bremer a day late. She brought over 40 cabin and 30 steerage passengers. The passengers told of a terrible experience. From Cherbourg she met gale after gale. On the third day out from Cherbourg, while a heavy sea was running and nearly all the passengers were seabuck in their berths, the ship's machinery suddenly stopped. Some of the officers thought the machinery had broken, others that the engine had gone to pieces, and still others that the rudder was disabled. After the ponderous vessel was free to drift, she began to drift. For eight hours she was adrift till she was 50 miles out of her course, when she started again.

The facts in the case are that on the evening of the 19th the head of the main motor was working. Investigation showed that one of the steel bands had broken off. To prevent the boiler from starting and a possible explosion, it was necessary to draw the fire, stop the ship and allow the ports to cool. Captain Thorburn laughed when the idea of danger in connection with the break was mentioned.

THE SOUND OF WAR.

Havana, Dec. 23—Hot firing can be heard late this afternoon from the vicinity of Pine railway station, twenty miles in the direction of Cimbito. It is supposed that the forces of General Parra do are engaged.

OCEAN WAVE ARRIVED.

GAS BUOYS.

Experiments Made in the East by Lieut. Hepp:

We have been favored by Lieut.-Col. Hepp, corps of engineers United States army, with the particulars of an experimental acetylene gas buoy which has been designed for river and harbor services.

The new buoy, in addition to being more powerful and economical than the electrically lighted buoys, is more reliable. If one of a chain of lanterns goes wrong all the others are affected; whereas the acetylene buoy, being an independent and self-contained unit, will not affect any other buoys by its failure.

In order to save expense in carrying out the experiment, a buoy which can buoy was pressed into service and modified for the test. A cylinder of boiler iron, closed at the bottom but open at the top, was attached to the diaphragm of the buoy and firmly supported at the lower end. In this cylinder were placed and securely fastened three tanks containing each about twenty pounds of liquefied acetylene gas under a pressure of 600 pounds to the square inch. These three tanks are connected by piping to the regulator, which reduces the pressure to that of a two-inch water column.

The two principal advantages which would obtain if this method of lighting proves after extended trial to be successful and practical are, first, large reduction in first cost of gas-lighted buoys, and, second, large increase in the power of the light.—Scientific American.
