After the British get their share of the streak of fat torn from the short ribs of the empire of China, they will be quite ready for Hawaii, if our senators are so timid and tedious as not to perceive the wide-open opportunity that we now possess.

The wheat war still rages in Chicago, and the battlefield will not be cleared until after January 1. One of the millionaires has got to pay a high price for a tremendous amount of wheat, and loss a few millions. The profit if the winding millionaire in part goes to the farmers, and while they can hardly gather their full share, they may, as philosophers, consent to see that they are paid on the installment plan.

We present the Hawaiian government a tip, says the Standard-Union. It advised that our senate is an impracticable body, the thing to do at Honolulu is to organize fifteen hundred marksmen from our southern and western states, provide them with magazine rifles and good pay, and levy an export tax on sugar to find the state in ready money. A little American standing army would serve the Hawaiian republic as a tonic.

## A WORD FOR JINGO STATESMANSHIP.

The magnificent state of Texas—the France of America—would have been rejected on the same line of objection that is urged against the acceptance of Hawaii as a territorial part of the United States. What bosh! Texas is a part of our own continent, and at the time of its admission was peopled by immigrants from the southern states. Besides this, the people of Texas were anxious to come in. Hawaii is over two thousand miles from our coast. It has a mongrel off-color population, and the petition to annex comes from a handful of wily Yankee carpet-baggers—Nashville Americans.

In answer to the above the Standard-Union says:

The Hawaiian Islands are of the American hemisphere. Geographically they belong to us. The world has been made more and more accessible to its inhabitants year by year, and the great nations are looking out for valuable territory. Russia grows rapidly, and is opening with the Siberian railroad a new wheat area; and she has possessed Port Arthur, where there is all the year navigation, and will never give it up. She is as certain to stay there as England in Egypt, and that is as certain as France in Algeria. The Hawaiian Islands are the greatest prize to be had peacefully that the world contains, and we the people of the United States would be on a par with the wild asses of the desert if we did not accept the fruit already in our basket. As for not being in a position to defend Honolulu, we must be in form to take care of ourselves by land or sea. Our fleet must be increased. We may stop fooling away money on creeks, and improve the four great harbors, and construct competent docks. We must enlarge our policy as one of the great powers. We should have a great fortress and harbor and garrison on the greater of the islands of the Hawaiian archipelago, and we should have another on our Northern Pacific Islands—the one nearest Japan. President Grant was right and the rest of us were wrong about a fortress, harbor, garrison and dock in St. Domingo.

The old whig party was wrong, and the democratic party right, in the policy of annexation that added invaluable territory. Daniel W. Lister, the greatest of American statesmen, was just in time to save a piece of Oregon. He was sleepy and slow to arouse. James K. Polk was a wiser man than Henry Clay about Texas annexation, and Andrew Jackson had the real American instinct about that. John Quincy Adams and Charles Sumner early in their lives saw what a storehouse of wealth Cuba was, and in the careers of our statesmen, interest in Cuba marks the high level of attainment. It is un-

coming to talk of mongred races. There are three of our states where the blacks outnumber the whites. Do the blacks rule then? Are they to be held in contempt or valued low because all the people are not Anglo-Saxons. Poles, Hungarians, Italians, or of other European races? They should be an order of statesmanship in the south carrying the politics of the section beyond the conceptions of the day before the swift steamers on all the seas the transcontinental railroads, the wires that are spun over the land and through the oceans, made the great globe we inherit one neighborhood. We do not need to, or care to, enter into competition in colonization with the armed empires of Europe in Asia, Africa and Australia, or even South America; but we are the dominant power on this continent, and we need Hawaii and Cuba, at least, not as states, but as territories."
