Seal Hunters of the Steamer Greenland Perish. Details of Awful Disaster. Frozen to Death on an Ice Floe Near Their Ship, which was Obscured by the Snow—List of the Dead.

St. Johns, N. F., March 28.—The steamer Greenland reached this harbor with a gruesome cargo. Twenty-five corpses were on the deck and 25 men were moaning in terrible suffering in the hold in the pain of frost-bitten limbs and bodies.
