out plainly and antagonize the war party. The aim of the planters and merchants who have lost confidence in Spain's ability to maintain her sway in the island, is either an American protectorate or annexation. Instead of growing stronger they become weaker in the presence of the crisis between the two countries, when every Spaniard who is not ready to undertake hostilities is looked upon with distrust. Their influence for peace cannot be counted on, either a check or guide to the popular movement. It is lost in the force of the army officers, the volunteers and the people. Some of the autonomist leaders, too, go with the plan. They are more bitter against the United States than are the intrapartidistas. They hold it responsible for the failure of autonomy, which by force of circumstances becomes their own failure. However, autonomists, either as leaders or as followers, are not numerous enough to make their sentiments a factor of importance. They can neither carry a policy which they favor to success, nor prevent the successful execution of a policy to which they are opposed. The functions of the autonomist government in the domestic concerns of the islands have been weak in international affairs it is a cipher. The Spanish classes do not need education as do the people of Spain. They know that the insurgents will never sue for peace, that the only hope of the peninsula lies in extermination. Possessing because of their superior knowledge the Spaniards in Cuba are triumphant over the reports of attempts, negotiations. They believe all efforts for an armistice will fail because the insurgents will not accept unless it is based on independence. That the Sagasta cabinet is preparing through the good offices of the United States for conceding the independence of Cuba is incredible to those loyal and patriotic supporters of the mother country. The course of Captain-general Blasco has not been such as to prepare them for such action. If this proves to be the case they will not be easily conciliated. They had rather talk of war with the United States. That is what they are doing while Madrid and Washington are talking peace.

Notice is hereby given to the public, to all those interested, and to all persons whatsoever, that Leander Lebeck, the contractor for the street improvement in the city of Astoria, has completed the "Commercial Street Extension Improvement" more particularly designated as the improvement of Commercial street from the south line of Twenty-third streets and Twenty-third street from the north line of Twenty-third street to the west line of Twenty-third streets and Twenty-third street from the north line of Twenty-third street to the west line of Young's Bay, where the west line of section intersects the south south line of said Young's Bay, a distance of about 2,000 feet.

Bridge to be a steel swinging drawbridge with 30, 100, 110, 120 or 135 foot openings, as directed by the secretary of war of the day.
