

SPANISH LEAVING NEW YORK CITY

Steamer Panama Will Sail Today For Havana.

SUPPLIES FOR ARMY IN CUBA

Shipment of Provisions From Cuban Relief Fund Abandoned as No Use in Havana to Receive Them.

New York, April 18.—When the Spanish line steamer Panama leaves for Havana and Mexican ports tomorrow she will have on board about 250 Spanish soldiers...

The Panama will take the place on the next trip of the Santa Dominga which was sunk off Progresso on April 3.

Officers at the Panama reported that quiet prevailed in Havana when she sailed for this port last Friday night.

army corps, each corps to consist of not more than three divisions. The president is to appoint in the volunteer army not exceeding one major-general for each organized army corps and division, and one brigadier-general for each brigade to be selected from the regular army or militia.

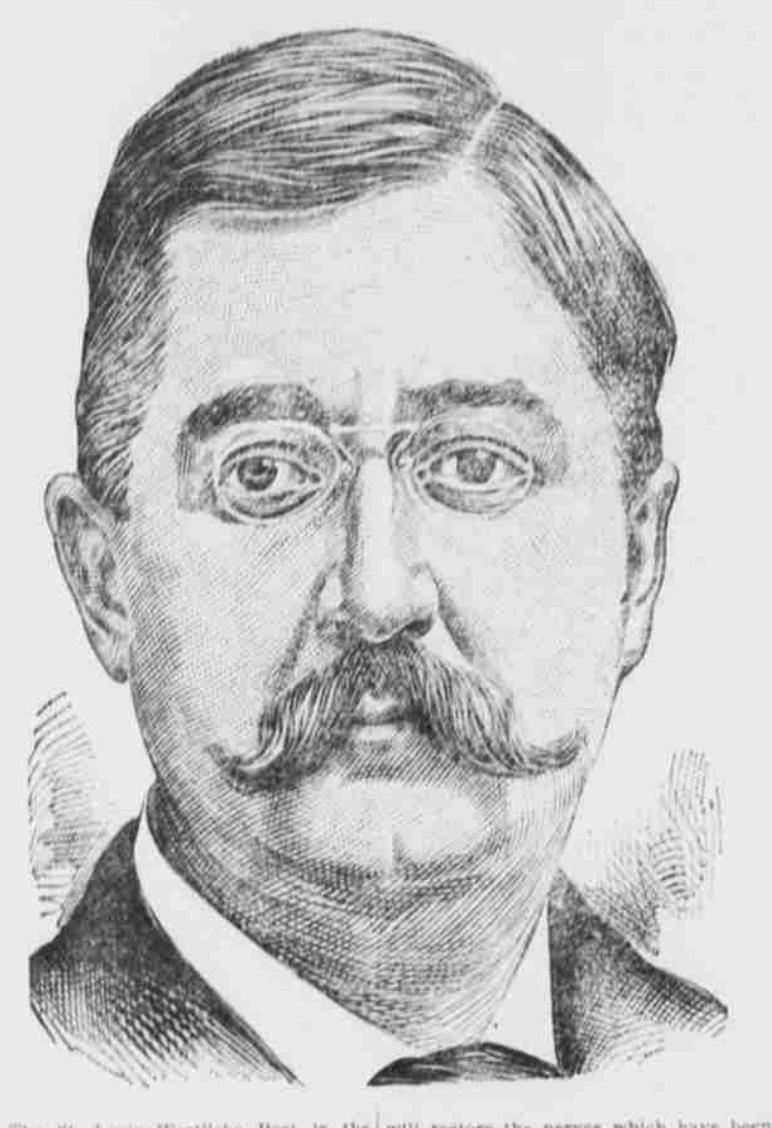
HOMEWARD BOUND.
