TROOPS DELAYED.
The Army Surgeon Refuses to Act With
Civil Physicians.

Olympia, May 1.—The work of mustering
in the troops at Camp Rogers has been
interrupted by an unexpected obsta-
cle. Adjutant General Corbin author-
ized Governor Rogers to appoint two civil
physicians to act with the army surgeon
as a board of examiners. The governor
was notified today by telephone that Dr.
J. L. Phillips, army surgeon, has refused
to act with the civilians, who are Dr. H.
G. Blalock of Walla Walla, and T. H.
Merrill of Tacoma. The governor is in
communication with the camp and ex-
presses the belief that matters will be ar-
ranged harmoniously and that the work
of examination will go on with little de-
lay.

DOUBLE TRAGEDY IN PENDELTON
Joseph Sewall, a Gambler, Kills a Wo-
man and Then Himself.

Penelton, May 4.—A double tragedy oc-
curred here at 3:15 p. m., as a result of
which Joseph Sewall, a gambler, lies dead
and May Drake, a demi-monde, lies at
the point of death with two bullet wounds
in the neck. The two lived together four
years. Two months ago he took her to
Canon City where his parents reside.
There she learned that he was of negro
descent and left him, coming to Pen-
delton. He followed and was refused ad-
mittance to her home, at which time he
threatened to kill her. This evening Sew-
all called to see her, and after talking
pulled a revolver while the girl's back
was turned and fired two shots, one en-
tering the left side of the neck below the
ear, ranging upward, and the other en-
tered just below the first and ranged
downward. The girl's father lives at
Yakima and she has a sister in Arling-
ton and two in Portland.

THE RATE SPENCER

New York, May 4.—The fast dispatch
boat Kato Spencer, which left Jack-
sonville Monday night to go into the service
of the Associated Press, arrived at Key
West this morning. The Spencer will op-
erate in conjunction with the famous dis-
patch boat Knickerbocker, which has been op-
erating in Cuban waters for some weeks
in carrying news for the Associated Press.
A widening scope of operations in West
Indian waters made necessary the char-
tering of a third dispatch boat for the
Associated Press, and the fast ocean
yacht Wanda has been secured for this
purpose, and sailed from here today. The
Wanda is recognized in her class, with
one exception as the fastest ocean steam
yacht in these waters. The Associated
Press has personal representatives with
the boat in Manila, at Cape Verde Is-
lands, Hong Kong, Rio de Janeiro, Buenos
Ayres, Madrid, and on the French trans-
it. In addition to which it has the ex-
clusive use of the news facilities of Hain-
ter, and the Havas and Wolff service
throughout Europe and Asia. A corre-
spondent is also on board the flagship
Brooklyn and one on the New York.

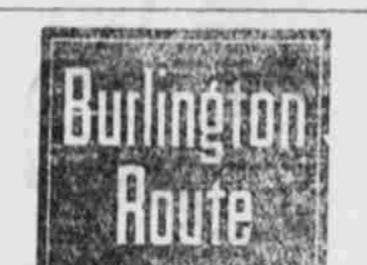
