All that was mortal of the late R. R. Maxion was laid to rest in Greenwood cemetery Sunday. The funeral, which was one of the largest seen in the city for many years, started from the residence at 130, the Catholic church bell tolling as the procession passed up Bond street to the Lurline dock, where the remains were put on board the steamer Lurline and taken to Greenwood cemetery. Rev. Father Dohman read the funeral services at the grave.

Mrs. Mary Ann Davis Johnson, widow of the late Captain Phil Johnson, died yesterday afternoon from cerebral disease at the home, after an illness of several months, aged 72 years. The deceased was born in Liverpool, England and came to Astoria in 1885. She leaves two grandchildren, Esther Johnson, aged 12, and Mary Johnson, aged 10. The funeral will take place tomorrow from the residence, corner Seventeenth and Exchange streets, and the remains interred in Greenwood cemetery.

The exhibit of Clatsop county products, maintained for the past eight months by the Astoria Progressive association, has borne fruit in more than one instance. Recently the Sea Beach Pickling works of Warrenton received an order for 20 cases of mixed clams from J. K. Armsley of Chicago. Accompanying the order was a letter in which it was stated that during the winter Chicago warblers had visited the exhibit room of the association in Astoria and had carried away samples of the clams, and were so pleased with them that they had revealed upon the writer to place an order. Mr. Harferty, manager of the clam picking works, stated that he traced a number of orders directly to the exhibit in the association hall.

Captain P. McCarty, of the British ship Part Logan, which arrived in Sunday, eleven days from San Francisco in charge of the mail, while ashore yesterday said that he had been chartered at \$750 for quick loading of wheat. He will take his ship to Portland today and return in about a week. "We had strong northwest winds and rains coming up and light winds from west to south coming into port. Day before yesterday, about 10 miles south of the mouth of the Columbia river, while sailing under a light wind we sighted dead ahead of us a large water spout. We lifted the ship and the monster moved to the south of us. We went into San Francisco with coal from New York. Day before yesterday, we had only 25 tons of rubbish ballast. Our expenses were just that much reduced, which of course adds to the profits of the voyage." While the captain was telling about his water spout Pilot Malcom remarked that it made a noise like a hurricane and was shaped like a funnel. It is the first water spout seen in these waters in many years. Stevedores William Johnson, sitting by, said that the story reminded him of the time when he was a member of the good old ship Ben Nevis. Proceeding through the Mediterranean one day while the officers were below he saw a water spout making for them. Picking up an old fashioned rifle he put on a cap, aimed for the water spout, pulled the trigger, but the gun only snapped. A second cap was tried with the same result. But the third time success crowned his efforts and the old gun went off with a bang, knocking him on his back on the deck, at the same time bursting the water spout.

I will tell you how we are getting along in three days to go up the river, and there are thousands of men strung along the line, there being from one to three hundred in a party. We usually make it a point to go to bed at 10 o'clock every night. All the boats are crowded leaving Wrangell. There are eight boats on the river now. Fred Lewis and George Shaver are in the Victoria, Captain Hale and Harry Bancroft are on the Ogilvie, C. P. R. boat, and Jimmie and Captain Bancroft of the Columbia river are on the Elwood. You can tell the Portland people that the steamer Elwood was the first steamer to reach Telegraph creek—that is above Glenora, where the trail starts in to Tustin lake, and it takes lots of time to get up. There is plenty of money to be made here now.
